'A plan to make a plan'

City imposes 90-day interim freeze on southeast/Tupper lot development

BY LAUREEN SWEENEY

The long-discussed future of St. Catherine St. and the Tupper lots was resurrected after a COVID hiatus when city council August 21 imposed a 90-day freeze on building activity in the southeast sector.

Impacting the area bounded by St. Catherine, Atwater, Dorchester and Wood, the future of the area had been a hot issue

Called a resolution of "interim control for the southeast sector," last week's freeze adopted by council was moved by Councillor Conrad Peart, commissioner of infrastructure, urban planning and architecture. It applies to all processes involving new building construction, extensions, demolition, conversions of buildings, cadastral operations, lot subdivisions and occupancy.

"This is 'step one' we're announcing tonight," Peart said. It is "a framework to pull all plan- continued on p. 14

Exception: 3-hour power outage

New by-law bans burning wood in fireplaces Sept. 1, 2024

Five months after giving notice of motion of the city's intent to ban the burning of wood in Westmount fireplaces, council at its meeting August 21 adopted By-law 1600 to do just that. It is to come into effect a year from now, September 1, 2024. The main exception is when a heating failure has lasted more than three

This is a generalization given that the by-law, which applies to all residential buildings in Westmount, also applies to the use of any "solid-fuel, heating and cooking device" though the impact has long been reported as having a direct effect on wood-burning fireplaces. These generally tend to be used in Westmount for the ambiance continued on p. 6



3 tickets among those given for off-leash offences

Public Security cracks down on wayward dog owners

Three Westmount dog owners were among those ticketted recently in an ongoing campaign by Public Security to enforce the city's leash and licence regulations, director Greg McBain said last week. This follows a number of complaints, especially concerning Summit Woods.

"It's getting crazy up there," he explained. This is despite signs outlining the regulations being posted not only at the entrances to the park but inside the park/ nature preserve as well. All dogs are required to be on leash between 10 am and 5 pm at this time of year.

On August 23 at 2:55 pm, for example, two large dogs were spotted off leash walking behind their owners on a trail in the woods. Each was given a ticket for \$230. One of the dogs was a German shepherd while the other was described as a Rotweiller-type.

Earlier the same day at 8:46 am, a man was seen playing with his dog in the

children's splash pad at Prince Albert Park. Nearby, a woman played with a child in the playground.

Not only could the dog's licence tag not be seen on the collar, but the owner turned out to be a non-Westmount resident. A ticket for \$230 was issued for the dog being

The fact that a child was playing nearby emphasized the importance of dogs being leashed, McBain said.

White-collar workers vote to accept new contract

The city's white-collar workers August 22 voted "overwhelmingly" to accept an agreement in principle concerning a new five-year contract, Mayor Christina Smith told the Independent August 24.

These are the city's administrative staff who had voted 88 percent on July 5 to give their union, the Syndicat des fonctionnaires municipaux de Montréal (SCFP), a mandate for pressure tactics and possible unlimited strike (see story July 11, p. 4).

The tentative white-collar settlement is described as a five-year collective agreement retroactive from January 1. It now moves to the drafting stage before ratifica-

"White-collar workers are an essential link in the municipal administration," Mayor Smith said in a statement on the city's website, "They are present in all city services to provide quality services to the population."

The news comes on the heels of a return to work August 10 by the blue-collar workers who had been on strike for seven weeks and whose contract at that time also moved to the drafting after an approval vote of 90 percent (see story August 15, p. 1).

Resulting from blue-collar strike

Temporary exemption granted for leaf blowers

If anyone should see or hear the use of leaf blowers before the permitted fall cleanup period (October 1 to December 1), it may be as a result of the blue-collar strike. This has resulted in a temporary exemption granted by city council August 21 to allow for a clean-up of accumulated debris in city parks and on streets.

The seven-week unlimited strike that took place between June 22 and August 9 ended with workers back on the job the next day.

According to last week's council resolution on leaf blowers, this is "a necessary exemption to allow for a city-wide cleanup of public spaces, such as parks and streets, and to avoid further delays in preparation for the winter season."

While the resolution went without comment at the meeting, Councillor Anitra Bostock, public works commissioner, who moved the motion, confirmed to the Independent that the exemption applies not only for city workers "but also for the contrac-

No referendum based on low register results

Council turns back the clock to allow more clinics

Low voter opposition to a city effort to remove restrictions on the size and number of medical offices and clinics in Victoria village resulted in council's unanimous adoption August 21 of a by-law to go ahead with allowing the status quo from before 2014 to prevail.

That is when the limitations had been imposed.

As previously reported, a two-day reg-

ister in opposition to removing the restriction resulted in 36 signatures, whereas 181 had been required to force council to either hold a referendum or to withdraw the proposed changes in the new by-law (see story August 15, p. 6).

The aim of the changes was to remove the restrictions in an effort to fill resulting vacancies and "revitalize" Victoria village.

Councillor Conrad Peart, whose commissionership includes urban planning, explained the council's decision to move forward with the changes stating that the registry vote was "far from close."

This, he said, was despite "a little discussion in the neighbourhood" concerning possible confusion over the dates of the register and that some voters may have stayed away given that the *Independent* was closed over the holiday period and not able to provide up-to-date reminders. "We don't shut down for the local newspaper," he said.

The city, he explained, had "acted within the parameters of the law" and had "erred on the side of caution" to avoid confusion over the dates by extending the date of the registry from the usual one day to two (July 19 and 20).

Tight parking

Opposition from some residents and

resulting petitions had been based largely on the impact that more medical offices might have on already tight parking.

This was the same concern that had initially caused the city to impose the limitations some nine years ago when the MUHC super-hospital was being built (see story February 11, 2014, p. 1). This did not materialize, leading to the recent move to remove the restrictions.

they provide.

The new By-law 1600 was presented by city clerk Denis Ferland, moved by Councillor Anitra Bostock, and unanimously adopted by the council.

It was addressed by Councillor Matt Aronson whose commissionership includes sustainability and climate change. Its aim, he explained, is to reduce the amount of fine particles that go into the air "so we are not contributing to the air we share with others."

A high concentration of these fine particles from the burning of wood and other



solid fuels has been attributed to respiratory health problems including asthma. This is true especially on days of heavy smog. This has been experienced this summer over the prevalence of forest fires.

The by-law contains many technicalities including emission rates set by Canadian and American standards. These can be checked on the city's website at Westmount.org/solidfuel where a mandatory declaration form can be downloaded.

Going back to 2011

Given that so many Westmount homes have prized fireplaces, this has been a discussion point on and off since at least 2011.

This is when then-mayor Peter Trent, as president of the Association of Suburban Municipalities (ASM), had told the *Independent* that Westmount and the other suburbs had been asked to join a Montreal ban but declined (see story August 30, 2011).

Retired city councillor Cynthia Lulham who spoke on the issue in 2015 had said she was concerned about the emergency use during an outage of possibly defective fireplaces that may have been neglected and not recently inspected. She cited the example of a house fire on Kensington during the ice storm of 1998 that had been pressed into use for prolonged heating despite presenting undetected defects.

Exercising my way to happiness

When I was 30 years old, I started to exercise. At that time, I was a single mother with two children, five and three, and was teaching high school in Montreal. I was an anxious person with a lot of energy and no outlet.

Teaching in the public school system in inner-city schools with difficult students didn't help. Somehow, I discovered swimming. As a child, I had always enjoyed swimming, but this was different. Swimming filled a need in me and I became obsessed.

In spite of the fact that I had no car, I managed to find a pool near the school where I taught. On weekends and in the summer, I swam at the Y. I needed my daily swim. During the school year, I would swim at lunchtime or during a spare between classes.

When I taught at St. Laurent high, I bought a three-month pass, which turned into seven years. I went five days a week and never missed a day. The pool employees would always ask my opinion about cleanliness, the water temperature, the quality of the towels, the new staff etc as if I was a manager!

The only time I missed was when my third child was born, two weeks before the birth and four weeks after.

In the summer of 1985, my husband and I drove across Canada on the Trans

Canada. I insisted on finding a pool every day.

Swimming pool tour

The drive took eight days. Let me tell you, it was hard to find a pool in northern Ontario, Manitoba and Saskatchewan. I made my husband stop at every motel that advertised a pool and I would ask the manager if I could swim for an hour. I always managed to get my swim in.

In the late 1980s, I met a woman who was a jogger. We became instant friends and have been running and now walking partners for the last 37 years. In winter, we ran along Côte St. Antoine or de Maisonneuve in snow and ice and slush. In summer, we would do the mountain, from

McGill medical school to the cross and back. School started at 8 am. I made breakfast for my children, and got them ready for school. My husband made their lunches. My friend and I met at 6:15 in the morning, and we ran, often when it was still dark.

The running for me was a form of relaxation. I entered into a meditative state and approached the day with focus and positivity. When running or swimming, I find solutions to the challenges of the day. When I finish, I feel refreshed and renewed. My husband claims that if I do not exercise, he needs to keep his distance from

Now in my 80s, I have transitioned into walking. My daily walk is over two hours,

and then I try to fit in a swim or a city walk. Often, I meet friends and walk in Westmount Park.

It is true that I don't get the exhilaration that I had from running or swimming, which are more strenuous and focused. Since my retirement, we start at 7:15 am and walking is a different scene. When running or swimming, one is self-focused, and when walking, one is focused outside oneself. This is why I have made many new mountain friends, like Bob Cranshaw, the late bass player and arranger for Sonny Rollins. It is interesting that walking has a social element, and walkers find satisfaction in this common drive. Somehow, when I am in the midst of nature, I feel a connection with the entire community.

Ukes are wasted on the young

To play a musical instrument well it helps to start when you're young. But you're never too old to play an instrument badly.

My husband Ron and I are in our eighties, and these days our social calendar tends to revolve around visits to doctors: the internist, the cardiologist, the endocrinologist, the podiatrist, the otolaryngologist.

So it's a nice change of pace, on Monday afternoons, when both of us attend a group class at the Cummings Centre, where we are learning to play...the ukulele.

Yes, the ukulele. It may not be the most beautiful instrument, but it had pleasant associations for us: the sweet nostalgia of Vaudeville, the tropical ease of its native Hawaii

Also, it seemed less difficult to pick up than the guitar: smaller and lighter, with only four strings instead of six. We remembered the novelty singer Tiny Tim in the 1960s, who strummed a uke to his falsetto rendition of "Tiptoe Through the Tulips."

How hard could it be?

As it turns out, learning the ukulele is no walk in the tulip bed. It is challenging, and sometimes frustrating, to wrap our aging fingers into chords on the uke's tiny neck. Ron, who is hard of hearing, regularly frets that he is tone-deaf as well. He's not, though he might be slightly rhythmimpaired. (He tends to play about a quarter-note behind.) And the daily routine between classes can be demanding: I feel pressured to practise, and guilty if I don't.

But along with these challenges come a growing sense of accomplishment and even pride. "Do you like the ukulele?" a grandchild of a classmate asked early on. "I will," she answered. We share her sense of determination. Thanks to a talented and patient young teacher – who, at 23, is six decades our junior – we have learned to play classic songs by the likes of Elvis Presley, Bob Dylan, James Taylor and the Beatles.

It has changed the way we listen to music; we are now more alert to the different rhythms and structures of the songs we hear.

Impact of playing music

"Music has a powerful effect on emotional well-being, including improving mood, decreasing anxiety and managing stress," our teacher has said. In our experience, that has been true. We began our journey during the enforced isolation of COVID's worst period, when our days lacked structure and we needed something to occupy our time and stimulate our brains. The lessons helped, and now that they have moved from Zoom meetings to in-person sessions, they offer the additional boon of social time in a small, likeminded group. Everyone laughs a lot in class, and we all enjoy the work.

There are also physical pleasures: when chords that once seemed daunting become familiar, and the little finger that initially stuck out begins to bend and respond to one's commands. We marvel that our nerve cells are still able to make new synapses, that our muscles and joints attend to our wishes, and that learning is still possible, confounding the conventional wisdom about older people.

And when we have shown off our tentative new skills for family and friends, the response has been gratifying. Instead of the eye rolls we feared, we get loving encouragement and something like respect for the work we have clearly put into our project. No one says we are good yet, exactly. But apparently we are adorable and a little inspirational, and at our age that seems to be enough.

If we keep practicing, maybe one day our doctors will let us entertain the crowds in their waiting rooms.

Police Report

One suspect believed responsible for three break-ins on Greene

Police investigators at Station 12 on Stanton St. think a single perpetrator may have been responsible for a series of breakins that took place at two businesses and a residential address on Greene Ave. over a 24-hour period.

In the first instance, around 5 am on August 18, a perpetrator attempted unsuccessfully to break into a gift and décor boutique on the west side of Greene between St. Catherine St. and de Maisonneuve Blvd. through the front door.

According to a police report of this and another incident on the same night, the suspect had more luck around 15 minutes earlier at the Jean Coutu pharmacy on the same stretch of Greene, where a glass front door was shattered, allowing the suspect

Station 12 community relations officer

Cst. Mike Yigit suggested the pharmacy appeared to have sustained the most damage out of the three incidents.

Although there was no mention in the police report of the branch's pharmaceuticals being targeted, he said glass display cases containing consumer merchandise, such as electronics and perfumes, were smashed and items were taken.

On August 19 also during the early morning hours, a residence on Greene Ave. was broken into and robbed of jewellery.

The police report suggested that a crowbar possibly was used in all three incidents.

Yigit suggested the investigators have good leads towards identifying the suspect. Security cameras captured video images, and footprints were also found, as were traces of blood, possibly from cuts caused by the broken glass.



ning aspects together such as zoning and buildings. It is a plan to make a plan."

He said the area had been "lacking a cohesive vision," explaining that to date various permits had been approved piece-meal, building by building, and that the city has been receiving more permit applications.

It will be "a long intensive project" called a Special Planning Program (SPP) in Quebec and would involve consultation with all city residents along with designated professionals. This was contained in a supplementary resolution.

Kez emphasizes 'plan for a plan'

"It's a plan for a plan," District 8 councillor Kathleen Kez repeated and emphasized to the *Independent* after the meeting. On returning for the council meeting from

a summer vacation out of the country, she said she had not been aware of recent permit applications that Peart said the city had been receiving for the area in question.

"I made it very clear to the council that while St. Catherine St. may be commercial, the north side of Dorchester should remain low-rise residential with lots of green public space, especially given the high densification of St. Catherine."

While developing the area, retaining green space north of Dorchester had been her main platform in the 2017 election. This had followed several consultations followed by an AGIL report on the revitalization of the southeast (see story February 12, 2019, p. 5).

This report had been commissioned by the then-outgoing council to consider ways

to integrate commercial St. Catherine east of Clarke with the residential area of Dorchester and to examine the development potential of the city's Tupper parking lots in between (see October 30, p. 2018, p. 1). It had been deferred to the newly elected council.

In the meantime, extensive renovation took place on the seven-storey building at 1100 Atwater, the corner of Tupper (see story August 18, 2020, p. 1).

As well, previous plans to build a mixeduse highrise at 4014-4022 on St. Catherine just west of Atwater across from Alexis Nihon Plaza were abandoned. This resulted in the developer forfeiting a monetary construction guarantee of \$1.4 million and leaving the property vacant (see story March 14, p. 1).

Myers books two film gigs, including in an inclusive 'Frankenstein'

Alice Myers is two jobs into fulfilling her goal of becoming a professional actress.

The 13-year-old Westmounter landed her first role (albeit a small one) in You Are So Not Invited to My Bat Mitzvah, a 2023 full-length feature starring Adam Sandler, which is due to be released on August 25.

More recently, she won a larger role in a short musical film called *Frankenstein: A Musical Comedy of Belonging*, which is now in production.

Revolving around themes of inclusion and acceptance, filming starts in October or November.

Divided into three acts although it runs less than 10 minutes, the low-budget film was written and is directed by Janine Parkinson, whose "day job" is as a content designer and copywriter in the entertainment industry.

Parkinson's previous short film, *Le Parking*, recently earned acclaim at the 2023 Make Me Laugh Film Festival for best comedy.

According to a summary of the *Frankenstein* film, "Frankenstein, labeled a monster, sparks a musical quest for belonging, revealing he's composed of the diverse hearts and body parts of those that fear him, inspiring a town's transformative journey of acceptance."

"I play a young girl (supporting role) in the village who accepts Frankenstein and gets the rest of the town to see that he is not a monster, but really just made of pieces of us all," Myers told the *Indepen-*

As it is a short film, it likely won't be widely distributed, added Myers. However, it will be premiering in both Montreal and Los Angeles, so there will be attempts to get it into the film festival circuit. As Parkinson's last film can be viewed on You-Tube, her latest effort may also be made

available there.

Now enrolled in the drama program at Royal West Academy, Myers has no doubt about pursuing acting as a career. "I think I'd like to do drama no matter what I do," she said, while adding she might also like to enroll at NYU or Yale University, which have reputable musical theatre and drama programs.

As a sign perhaps of how the acting domain is evolving, the casting calls she's answered so far have all taken place through Facebook, rather than on an inperson basis. Virtually every day, she scans the web for casting opportunities and answers as many as possible.

"Open calls during the first round of casting are quite rare nowadays," she said, noting that imposed isolation over the past three years during the COVID pandemic made a significant impact on casting methods.
