Following a seniors' luncheon at the Contactivity Centre on Thursday and a PI party for kids and parents on Friday at Victoria Hall, this year's main daylong outdoor Saturday activities at King George (Murray) Park feature the addition of new ones, the return of others and the tried-and-true traditional events.

We have kept all the staples for carnival," said Dave Lapointe, division director, Culture, Sports, Recreation and Social Development. "These include tobogganing, sleigh rides, sugar shack, hot dog lunch, and the winter classic hockey game.

Mayor Christina Smith, city councillors Elisabeth Roux, Jeff Shamie and Kathleen Kez and the city's administration welcomed José Tiburcio, Bell Canada – senior manager municipal affairs, January 24 at 10:30 am to raise a flag outside city hall for Bell's Let's Talk campaign.

This year, Bell's Let's Talk campaign is focused on creating real change including organizations that provide services to the community, learning about mental health issues and starting conversations with loved ones, and nurturing well-being with positive practices.

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# 135 requests for 'special passing attention'

Public Security checked out 135 requests over the holiday season for the Special Passing Attention (SPA) service involving residents going away who want officers to check out their properties and remove tell-tale signs that homes are vacant.

Over this season, officers even made footsteps in the snow while checking doors and filed six reports detailing properties found not to be completely secured. These included unsecured secondary doors, meaning those at the side or rear.

Officers also reported removing parcels left on porches and were reported to be "key" in identifying several suspects involving thefts.

#### **PSO** recovers stolen RAV4

A Public Security patroller on Lansdowne Ridge January 20 discovered a parked car that had a window broken, contents on the back seat that appeared to have been rummaged through and a dash camera ripped off. Police were contacted and identified the car, a RAV4, as having been stolen in Ontario. It was discovered at 2:50 pm. The RAV4s are reported to be among the most sought cars by thieves.

#### Man admits to graffiti, ticketted \$664

Public Security received a call January 18 at 3:18 pm for a man defacing public property, officials said. A responding officer arrived on the scene in the lane behind Le Fournil bakery at 4910 Sherbrooke, just west of Prince Albert, and found a man with a large white-paint marker.

A witness who had stopped to question the subject was simply told "I'm tagging."

Police were called and arrived shortly after. Aged in his 30s, the Montreal resident was issued a ticket that totalled a fine of \$500 for defacing public property and a court fee of \$164.

#### **PSO** thanked for assistance

Rather than a complaint related to a snow storm January 11, one email was reported to have been received by Public Security from a resident of Academy Rd. as a "shout-out" for the help she had received from a passing patroller.

"The officer stopped and quickly dug out a path for her car," said assistant director Kimberley Colquhoun. When asked, she identified him as PSO Anthony Randrianasolonirina.

#### Need for donations continues

Despite a final total of \$6,700 received in Public Security's holiday food drive, requests continue to be reported, said assistant director Kimberley Colquhoun. In anticipation of the need. "I kept a few gift cards aside, as well as a box of non-perishable items," she said. "The need is dire this year and expected to continue through February."

#### **Remember: No more** move-car alerts

Residents with on-street parking stickers are reminded that the city no longer calls them to warn of no-parking for snow removal operations, Public Security officials said last week.

This type of time-consuming "courtesy" call system was abandoned last year in the hopes residents will check for no-parking signage that can be placed some 12 hours before the snow removal.

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## Reconstruction of Upper Lansdowne to be portrayed Major work proposals to be outlined at Vic Hall Feb. 1

A third public meeting on the city's 2024 reconstruction project of Upper Lansdowne between Edgehill and Lansdowne Ridge is to take place Thursday, February 1 at Victoria Hall. The work is slated for 26 weeks from May though some of November.

Scheduled as a drop-in opportunity "at your convenience" from 4 to 8 pm, the Vic Hall event is an information session described as providing the proposed plans following feedback and comments from two other meetings, workshops and surveys.

Councillor Antonio D'Admico, of District 1, who reminded residents at the council meeting January 15 about the information meeting, also referred all concerned to the city's Engage website for details.

The previous meetings took place in November mainly involving concerned residents and the use of those accessing Summit Woods, picking up or dropping off students at Villa Ste. Marcelline on Upper Belmont.

The project is a major one in this year's



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The re-design feature seemed to dominate many of the comments already expressed. These include challenges, concerns and suggestions that can be found on some 35 pages of posted feedback by the consultation firm of Transfert.

These were identified as a need for designated crosswalks especially to access Devon Park, sidewalks used for taking walks, walking dogs, jogging and going to the park. Also reported were speeding, snow management and the need for additional or wrongly placed vegetation.

Others include common concerns around school zones particularly at school peak hours including the volume of traffic, drivers parking on existing crosswalks, double- or tripled-parked and failing to stop at stop signs.

## Design & safety come on heels of consultation Second contract awarded for Forden re-development

A second contract was awarded by city council January 15 for the re-development of Forden Ave. and Forden Cresc. – an area of confusing street design for which an initial contract for public consultation had been awarded December 4.

This latest one was to improve the design and safety of the two Fordens at a cost of \$366,770, including taxes, to Avizo Experts-Conseils Inc. Three other firms had also submitted bids, but their amounts were not reported since the "professional" contract was subject to a bid-weighting grid that includes other considerations such as quality.

Forden Ave. is where many motorists from Westmount Ave. turn down to Montrose and where northbound traffic takes a reverse route. It was on the intersecting Forden Cresc. where a cyclist had been fatally injured when reportedly blinded by sun (see story July 14, 2020, p. 10).

While the city had already implemented many recommendations of a coroner, now that reconstruction is required, several

councillors weighed in on the need to rebuild the two streets to be as safe and functional as possible.

#### Volume of traffic

These included District 2 councillor Elisabeth Roux, who explained that when she had gone door to door campaigning, she found Forden-area residents very unhappy over the volume of traffic, and stated that "I'm just happy people will be heard."

Emphasizing what he called the value of public consultation over street re-design, District 1 councillor Antonio D'Amico had noted when the first contract was awarded that two recent public consultations on Upper Lansdowne in November had been well attended. A third one, called a public information session, takes place this Thursday, February 1, at Victoria Hall (see separate story p. 7).

The contract was moved by Councillor Conrad Peart, whose commissionership includes infrastructure and urban planning.

#### Schedule for Saturday

Saturday's outdoor events generally start at 10 am and wind up at 2 to 3 pm. Among them are the winter classic hockey game at 10 am featuring the M7 (under age 7) players of the city's in-house league. The sleigh rides are scheduled from 10:45 am to 3 pm. During the lunch period (12 noon to 1:30 pm) free hot dogs will be offered and a "chuck a puck" contest will take place.

Between 1 and 2 pm, people are invited "to skate with the city's mascots" and the main events conclude at 3 pm with family skating. Anyone planning to toboggan is reminded to bring their own and advised to wear a helmet.

# Former train station needs surveillance cameras

I would like to bring attention to an incident that occurred last weekend in our residential complex. Unfortunately, our back lane was defaced with malicious scribbles drawn by vandals. Our complex consists of 16 townhouses located beside the old train station. (Please see photo.)

As you can imagine, this problem breaks our hearts. It is too close to our soul. It is a nightmare to be in a place where vandals have the time to make such a mess.

In 2010 and 2012, I wrote two letters addressing the problems in this area. And it took 12 years to have a steel trash receptacle installed! Only last year, all the lights were fixed, also after 12 years.

Back in 2012, we suggested that the city

buy and install non-invasive surveillance cameras directed at the walls of the old train station, along with warning signs to serve as a deterrent to vandals. The cameras could be triggered at sunset and could be on until morning.

Shall we wait 12 more years to have noninvasive surveillance cameras at the old train station? Shall we just accept that the vandals own our city and our houses?

Shall we just accept that allocating a couple of thousand dollars for this solution is too costly for the city?

How come the city had enough money to buy the lighted tree beside the entrance of the library? It looks dated and out of place – just waste of money.

The vandals should not feel safe destroying someone's property.

## Police Report Remote video captures images of Westmount Square boutique thief

Armed with a good description, crime investigators at the Montreal police's Station 12 are hoping to identify the perpetrator of an aggravated robbery that took place at a Westmount Square boutique on January 19.

Around 1:30 pm, he took advantage of the momentary absence of a store employee to raid the cash register, without realizing he was being watched remotely over a security camera connection.

According to Cst. Mike Yigit, Station 12's community relations officer, the boutique employee had to leave for a few minutes. So, she phoned her employer to advise him that he should switch on the remote camera system so that he could keep an eye on things during her absence.

While monitoring the video feed, the employer saw a man enter the boutique. After seemingly realizing there was no one there, the suspect was seen proceeding behind the point-of-sale counter where he was observed forcing open the closed cash register.

"So, the boss at a distance saw what was going on, called the employee and told her to rush back to the boutique," said Yigit. "When she got there, she saw the man leave, exit the store."

Since the employer had told her he had witnessed the suspect tampering with the cash register, she immediately checked and saw it was empty. She followed the suspect out into the mall corridor, where she confronted him. He responded by pushing her away.

Cst. Yigit pointed out that with that pushing gesture, the suspect's act of robbery took on an element of violence. Shortly after this, according to a complaint report filed by the employee, the suspect dropped the money he'd stolen and ran away.

The investigators have a good description of the suspect furnished by the boutique employee, as well as clear images of him from the video security system.

#### One more car theft

Although a wave of automobile thefts that swept through Westmount late last year appears to have receded for the time being, there was one exception at the beginning of last week.

According to Station 12 incidents reports, a Jaguar F-Pace compact luxury crossover SUV was stolen on January 21 from a parking spot near the corner of Forden and Montrose avenues in the middle area of Westmount.

"It's the typical story," said Yigit, noting that the circumstances of the theft matched those of many other stolen car incidents. The last time the owner saw the vehicle was at 10 o'clock the previous evening. By the next day around noon, he noticed it was missing.

#### No break-ins, perhaps due to cold

It's notable that Station 12 has received

no reports of household or business breakand-enter incidents at least since the beginning of the year.

"Usually they come in waves," said Yigit, adding that burglaries tend to be committed by individuals or sometimes small groups of organized criminals who become active periodically.

"Also, the weather can be a big factor," he continued. "It's been very cold. And when it's very cold, the burglars don't like to come out."



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# Naked woman draws first responders outside Atwater Metro station

In the early hours of the evening of January 25, police and an ambulance were called to the corner of Atwater Ave. and de Maisonneuve Blvd. to assist a middle-aged woman who had removed all her clothing and was causing a commotion out on the street, right outside Atwater Metro station.

Sabrina Gauthier of the SPVM (Service

de Police de la Ville de Montréal) media relations department indicated that police were called to the scene because "a naked woman was on the street screaming."

Eventually paramedics were witnessed attending to her.

Gaulthier said the police report at the time indicated that the individual was very agitated and "suffered from mental illness."

A naked woman was photographed June 14, 2023 walking east on the north side of St. Catherine St. just before Wood. Given the absence of context, the *Independent* did not publish the (unsalacious) photo.

The *Independent*'s source queried at the time: "A new trend?" but it is not known if this incident is connected to the January 25 event.

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# Now open Alexis Nihon-Westmount Square tunnel closes for 10 days

The tunnel that connects Westmount Square to Alexis Nihon and the Atwater Metro station was recently closed for 10 days. The closure started on January 12, and the tunnel was re-opened January 22.

Residents of Westmount Square's towers 2 and 3, who are largely *de facto* condo owners (see November 29, 2022, p. 9), were notified of the closure by a letter that was affixed to the doors of their elev-

ators by Creccal Investments Ltd., which is a property management company that owns the shopping mall and office towers.

The tunnel was closed due to a water leak, the *Independent* learned when a resident of tower 3 spoke about the incident.

The *Independent* had previously reached out to Noemie Palenzuela and Mélanie Castonguay in the marketing and communication department of Alexis Nihon, but there was no response in time for the *Independent's* print deadline. The *Indepen*  *dent* also reached out to Amir Chouyoukh, who is a property manager at Creccal, but no response was received.

"It has been repaired," said the resident of Tower 3 – who wanted to go on record but requested anonymity – while referring to the ceiling of the tunnel where there had been a water leak.

On inspection of the tunnel, there is still what appears to be damage on the ceiling in one section where a quantity of water seems to have seeped through and stained it in a large patch. A black rectangle appendage was affixed to another portion of the ceiling where there had also been damage. New plastering of those areas has not yet been undertaken.

When the *Independent* last investigated the issue (see May 6-7, 2008, p. 1), the consensus seemed to be that Westmount Square was responsible for the tunnel, although there were other views. Creccal bought its part of Westmount Square in 2015.

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# Neven working to bring beach tennis to Cuban kids, Stayner Park

The word "tennis" conjures classic images: courts, rackets and yellow balls. Beach tennis, however, is a slightly different game.

Glenn Neven, owner of Greene Ave.'s MyShoeShop.ca, is a super fan. He's also a super player: he won the 2022 mixed doubles championship in Aruba.

Beach tennis doesn't actually need a beach, although the game is only played on a sand surface. It is governed by the ITF (International Tennis Federation). The ball is the same size, but softer. And it stays in the air the entire game. Rackets are shorter – "more like a paddle" – and they are held higher above the body, like a "tennis volley." There's only one serve, and one final point: no advantage in/out. The court is the same size as beach volleyball, and the net is 1.7 meters high.

Just back from Cuba, Glenn had a tale to tell. Working with Carlos Toledo, a pro there, he brought beach tennis to a modest little sports and racket club in Havana.

"This club had no running water and no electricity. The kids were playing on dirt." So Glenn suggested that sand be brought in. But first they had to build a

fence so "the sand wouldn't be stolen." with

However, the local government didn't allow the fence. So now Glenn has a mission. He's raising money so that they can transport kids to a local beach.

"I made a logo for them, and I'm using the Facebook beach tennis community with the goal of buying them equipment as well. We don't need much; about \$2,500."

I was surprised to learn that in Montreal, apparently there are about 100 courts suitable for beach tennis – for example in TMR and Mohawk Park, and at Tennis 13,

where Glenn used to play on the men's tennis team.

He also has a local objective: to bring beach tennis to Stayner Park.

"There's already an asphalt volleyball court there." He plans to make a submission to the city of Westmount.

The all-volunteer Westmount Battery held its annual dinner at the armoury of the 2nd Field Artillery on Côte des Neiges Rd. just outside Westmount on October 25. "We also fired one of the 214-year-old Westmount cannon," said battery president and former city councillor Patrick Martin.

The two cannon are owned by the city of Westmount and were in Westmount

Park to the east of the library from 1899 until 2006.

They have only recently been refurbished with new carriages and made fireable (see September 29, 2015, p. 1, September

3, 2019, p. 8, November 2, 2021, p. 1, 29). The first, post-1897, firing of a cannon

was for Queen Elizabeth II's platinum jubilee (see June 7, 2022, p. 8). The 1897 occasion was Queen Victoria's diamond jubilee.
