The new writers' program is the "next step" for people who have already created something and want to prepare it for publishing.


This is also the season to sign up for tennis and pickleball instruction as well as youth soccer, baseball, rugby, spring hockey, safe cycling and babysitting.

City joins with 3 others, takes leading role

New recycling contract awarded to new collector

BY LAUREEN SWEENEY

A new contractor will be picking up recycling material from blue boxes following the city council's approval February 5 of a new three-year contract. This is for the collection and transportation of the material awarded for the first time on a group basis involving the city and three other de-merged municipalities.

While the others are Pointe Claire, Côte St. Luc and Dollard des Ormeaux, Westmount has been designated to "lead the pack" concerning this contract, said Councillor Matt Aronson, who moved the resolution as commissioner of sustainability.

It was awarded on a three-year basis to WM Quebec Inc., described as the lowest conforming bidder, at a collective total of \$3,228,268 continued on p. 13

Theme inspired by library's 125th anniversary

52nd McEntyre writing competition under way

In keeping with this year's 125th anniversary of the Westmount Public Library, the McEntyre Writing Competition is being launched with a library theme.

"For this special year, we are asking students to write about the importance of the library in a community," said chief judge Liz McCallum.

"Some ideas may be: What does the library mean to you? What is your favourite place in the library and why? What would your dream library look like?"

With a deadline of March 24, the competition is open to students in grades 1 through 11 (Secondary 5) who live in, or attend school, in Westmount. Written entries will be accepted for Grades 1 and 2 while electronic entries are accepted for Grades 3 to 11.

While a number of entries are being received almost daily, the first ones came from the Montreal Oral School for the Deaf, McCallum said.

She and children's librarian Wendy Wayling visited Roslyn School February 6 as one of many they are going to in order to explain the competition. Some class


tours have been arranged, she said, "and it has been interesting to see how much time the students spend looking around and talking to the librarians."

Last year, the competition received 1,100 entries, for which 65 judges were needed along with many other volunteers.

The annual competition is in its 52nd year after being originally launched in 1972

as the Westmount Scholarship Trust Fund by former mayor Peter McEntyre (1970-1971).

McEntyre, who refused to accept his provincially imposed mayoral salary, donated it to create the competition and use for prizes. He maintained that being on city council should be considered to be community service.

Neighbours opposed more delay for 45 Roxborough

City allows post-demolition owners to build house to new plan

Additional time was given February 5 at a demolition hearing to new owners of an "empty" lot at 45 Roxborough to build a house "to their tastes." This is rather than executing a plan submitted to the city by the former owner as part of a previous demolition request.

The 1956 one-storey house had, in fact, gone through two previous demolition hearings: the first to remove the roof to allow for a second storey (see June 25, 2019, p. 5); the second when the first demolition had exceeded the permitted amount (see story May 17, 2022, p. 10).

Last week's hearing to extend the time was met by strong opposition from two neighbours fed up with how the vacant lot's "ugly" condition had already been allowed to drag on.

"I am trying to sell my house," explained one. But who would want to buy it, he said, given the current eyesore, new house plans that nobody has seen, and another 12month delay?

A deposit guarantee was paid by the original owners and has been confiscated by the city, explained Urban Planning director Frédéric Nault. Two items remained February 5 for the city council, sitting as the demolition committee, to consider: a delay to build and the new plan.

Nault offered to show the neighbours the new plans that had already been recommended for approval by the city Planning Advisory Committee (PAC), though these were not presented at the meeting.

Back and forth since September

Councillor Mary Gallery, who sits on the PAC, explained that the new plans had gone back and forth between the PAC and the new owners since September.

Councillor Matt Aronson, who also spoke, said he understood the frustration felt by the neighbours. "The (previous)

owners took down the house and then did nothing. To me, it makes no sense."

After Nault's offer to share the plans with the neighbours, Councillor Elisabeth Roux, who had chaired the meeting as promayor, adjourned the session, saying that "we'll all try to make [the new house] move forward" to the enjoyment of the neighbourhood.

Looking back

The demolition process had started in 2019 with the first of the two demolition hearings. This was for a partial demolition application (68.3 percent) authorized on June 17, 2019. When the demolition work exceeded what had been authorized, a second demolition application hearing took place in May 2022 to endorse the 89.9 percent demolition work already completed.

Present-day

In a written explanation of the somewhat complicated situation, Nault explained that "in the decision of May 5, 2022 authorizing the demolition, a period of 12 months was allowed to build the new house. In the meantime, the property had been sold and the new owners wished to build their home to their own taste."

Discussions ensued with the new owners throughout 2023 "and culminated in a favorable decision by the council on the new plans last November. With the approval of the construction plans, the current owners are now able to establish a realistic construction schedule and undertake the work as required."

As a result, two conditions are being added to the 2022 demolition resolution: namely that "the demolition committee accept the modification to the replacement program, in accordance with the plans of the revised replacement program" and that an extension be granted for the start of construction of the new building to be undertaken within a 12-month period.





including tax credits, for which Westmount's portion will be \$499,964. The contract runs from April 1, 2024 to March 31, 2027 with two renewable 12-month options.

No changes in pick-up

The pick-up times in Westmount are to remain unchanged and Westmount will not be "giving up anything" by taking advantage of lower costs provided by being part of a larger contract, Aronson told questioner John Fretz of Lansdowne.

He also told Richard Dufour, of Anwoth, that because the contractor's role is to collect and transport the material to the recycling centre in Lachine, "Westmount has no say after that. Once it leaves the centre, it's the responsibility of the agglomeration."

Westmount's previous contract with Ricova had been questioned previously after "questionable practices" had been raised regarding glass being sent to landfill (see story April 26, 2022, p. 10).

Carol is a considerate, thoughtful and kind-hearted seven-year-old who adores her older sister. Carol thrives on routine, joins her sister for story time and is very good at following instructions. She struggles with confidence, which may be the residual effects of coming from a chaotic, unstructured home environment.

She needs lively encouragement to fully participate in play. However, with coaxing, she is able to love playing in the park, splashing in pools and walks.

Carol has a good appetite and eats a variety of foods. She does well with one-on-one interactions and feels helpful to be included in household chores, e.g., making her bed and tidying up her toys.

Juana is an adorable, energetic lively nine-year-old who is definitely a people person. In that, she loves to talk and always has something to add to the conversation. While developmentally on track in most respects, she needs help in school and continues to struggle with homework and bringing home her required assignments, thus, it is important that the caregiver has patience and is able to structure and monitor homework time and provide assistance and support to help her complete her school work.
