Status of some rec programs unknown at press time New COVID restrictions mean adult hockey suspended

Quebec's new red-level restrictions announced October 5 have suspended all adult hockey in Westmount and related ice rental, director general Benoit Hurtubise said at press time. The city was still awaiting guidelines from Hockey Quebec regarding youth programs related to practices, he said.

Unclear re: fitness, dance

Also unclear, he said, was whether the fitness, dance and other group activities, such as those at Victoria Hall, could be maintained as long as the current social distancing and other protocols are retained.

Anyone involved would be informed, Hurtubise said.

The new prohibition on gatherings in public spaces announced October 1, however, means community organizations will not be able to use city parks and will probably lead to the removal of the tent outside city hall, he said, but "School activities are not affected."

Dave Lapointe, director of Sports and Recreation, said the department was still planning its registration before the suspension of team sports was announced. Registration for winter programs is still tentatively planned for November 17."

Some classes cancelled

Some of the department's fall classes scheduled for Victoria Hall had already been cancelled but because of low registration – as sometimes happens – rather *continued on p. 6, bottom*

Pick-up service only slightly affected by COVID 'red' Library launches 10 upcoming online events for October

The reservation and pick-up service called "contactless loans" used by the Westmount Public Library over the last few months has only had to undergo "small changes" as part of Quebec's new October 1 red-level restrictions, according to library director Julie-Anne Cardella.

While the library has been essentially closed to the public since March, the table where members have been able to pick up reserved items in the main hallway has now been moved to the library door so staff can work warmly while patrons can still get their "contactless loans" without actually entering the library. A scheduled appointment is not needed.

Unlike some libraries, Westmount's had never advanced to the next opening "stage" that allowed for browsing, Cardella pointed out. "So strangely enough it's now almost business as usual."

Right after Premier François Legault announced late September 28 that libraries would be closed October 1, however, "we must have received 500 reservations that night," she said. "People had been concerned they would not be able to receive what they wanted."

"Purchasing in bulk leads to a better price," he explained, as council voted to spend \$244,263 for the supply of "approximately 10,000 metric tons *[sic]* of road salt and approximately 250 metric tons *[sic]* of processed salt for the winter season 2020-21."

40 trucks hired

When it comes to the snow removal trucks, however, the city goes it alone to obtain some 40 of them with drivers for a

minimum guarantee of \$9,500 per truck before taxes based on hourly rates set by the Quebec Transport ministry.

Council therefore authorized a minimum amount of \$380,000 plus taxes for the supply of 40 trucks for the season from Transvrac Montreal and at a maximum of \$1,171,500 plus taxes.

The contract of Denis René who had initially been appointed in October 2019 to the position of roads superintendent for Public Works was extended for a fourth time to April 30, 2021.

St. Catherine St. work awaits construction permit 'Le 4469' to convert vacant lot into 'high end' rental units

A new five-storey apartment building approved August 3 by city council on the site of two demolished landmarks on St. Catherine St. is now awaiting its construction permit before the shovel can start digging.

This city requirement involves a number of construction details to be supplied from the contractors and sub-trades. work that is proceeding "very slowly," said Lawrence Vatch, spokesperson for the project called "Le 4469" located just west of Metcalfe.

Taking its name from the address of the Westmount BBQ (formerly known as the St. Urbain BBQ), which had to be razed after a fire November 28, 1991, the project was described last week by Vatch as providing six "high end" rental units.

The "condo-style" units, as he calls them, are to be sprinklered and feature heated bathroom floors, their own central air, hot water tank, granite counters and "lots of cupboard space."

One ground-floor unit

The one ground-floor unit of 900 square feet is designed to have one bedroom and its own attached private garage. Each of the second and third levels has two twobedroom, two-bathroom units of 1,100 sq. ft. each while a single unit will take up the fourth floor and the smaller recessed fifth one.

Because this unit will be occupied by Vatch and his wife, Evelyn Wajcer, this leaves five of the new units available for rental.

The project is being developed by Le 4469 Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of Evelyn Wajcer Holdings Inc., incorporated 32 years ago, which owns the property as well as KIDS Daycare next door at the northwest corner of Metcalfe and St. Catherine.

The new building, designed by Rick Rubin of Fugurr Architects, is to be faced with St. Marc limestone. Conforming to city zoning has helped hasten the process, Vatch said. It is hoped that occupancy might be possible "as early as the summer."

Waiting for more space

The well-known Perrette's store and building at 4471 St. Catherine that had adioined the barbecue and also sustained damage in the fire was later demolished in 1995, leaving the two narrow, separatelyowned lots appearing to be one property.

"While we had bought the Perrette property in 1993 directly from Perrette Inc.,

it was too small to build on," Vatch explained. But it wasn't until acquiring the (4469) property two years ago from Boulajeri & Papamonioudis that the two vacant lots could be legally amalgamated into an enlarged one allowing for the current pro-

EDITORIAL

Advice to provincial government: be explicit in your messaging, think ahead about minority groups

The province is doing its best to make good decisions about the COVID pandemic and to inform us of them. I would like to make the two following suggestions about its messaging:

 Anticipate questions about less frequent, "non-standard" or exceptional situations. Rather than wait for reporters to ask about this or that minority group, and how new COVID rules apply to it, have a list of groups ready beforehand and explain right away how (if applicable) the new provisions apply to each of them, including: those who live alone, those who need care, those who are vulnerable, those who have two (or more) houses, those with children in school, those who live in multi-generational households, those with cleaners or other domestic staff, those who need repairs or who are in the midst of renovations, those who use public transit, those who travel (in- or outside the province), those who work, those who work in perilous situations, those who don't work et cetera.

We shouldn't have to wait a few days into a new regime to hear about how new rules apply to some or all of these known groups.

• Be very clear about the scope of any new

rules. For instance, it seems clear now that the new red-zone rules prohibit *all* gatherings *anywhere* with people outside of one's household/address, but when first mentioned, that was not made explicit, leading many to assume that the outdoor gatherings that they had been having for months were still okay. I would suggest a wording like this:

"Your household is composed of those people who live at your address. All indoor and outdoor gatherings with people outside of your household are prohibited (except demonstrations with masks), including gatherings that respect the six-foot rule or with masks, and including gatherings in private back yards and on private front porches, in public parks, and on public sidewalks and streets."

November 1 school board election EMSB candidate Rapoport sees room for an independent voice

Irwin Rapoport, who is challenging incumbent English Montreal School Board commissioner Julien Feldman for the EMSB's only seat (Westmount-Sud Ouest) not already won by acclamation, is a longtime freelance journalist in west-end Montreal, as well as a former school commissioner and municipal election candidate.

An NDG resident, he became active in community journalism in the early 1990s when he started writing for the weekly *Suburban* newspaper.

By the early 2000s, he was a regular freelance contributor to a number of trade publications in Canada and the U.S., including at least one for the construction sector. As well, he has previous experience as a school board commissioner.

During the early 1990s, he sat on the council of commissioners of the former Protestant School Board of Greater Montreal, which was merged, along with several other boards, in 1998 into the EMSB.

In the early 2000s, he ran unsuccessfully in Côte des Neiges for a Montreal city council seat. For those who are habitual listeners to CJAD, Rapoport is a regular caller during listener phone-ins.

Of the 10 commissioners acclaimed on September 27, only Montreal West-NDG commissioner Joseph Lala was acclaimed as an independent. All others were part of acclaimed EMSB chairman Joe Ortona's Team Ortona.

Since Rapoport believes the EMSB should have at least some alternative representation, he says voters in Westmount should elect him as the council of commissioners' second independent member.

"An independent point of view is required on council to ensure all points of view are put forward without being compromised by party politics," Rapoport said in an interview with the *Independent*. "Public institutions have a responsibility to be beholden to their stakeholders for their actions, and I will strive to ensure that occurs."

However, at the same time he says he respects the leadership of the EMSB's newly-elected chairman and says he is not concerned Team Ortona's overwhelming majority might cause the council to backslide into a situation similar to the one that saw the EMSB placed in trusteeship.

"Mr. Ortona said that he wants respectful and constructive debate, and I trust him on that implicitly," said Rapoport. He said he had no comment to make on Julien

"This election is not about myself or Mr. Feldman. This election is about the community having an elected commissioner who's going to speak out for the issues concerning the ward, and issues concerning the EMSB as a whole, and for the protection of the independence of our English school boards."

Progressive regional alert and intervention system

The Progessive regional alert and intervention system specifies which additional measures each health region must take to slow the transmission of the virus. These depend on the alert level reached and are intended to limit the health, social and economic impacts of COVID-19, protect those who are most at risk and avoid overburdening the healthcare system.

The alert levels are established based on the recommendations of public health authorities who regularly review the situation, taking into account the epidemiological situation, transmission control and the capacity of the healthcare system.

Don't forget that everyone must adopt behaviours that limit transmission of the virus. We do it to ensure that our children can keep going to school, to protect our seniors, to ensure the safety of our healthcare workers and to revive our economy. **Follow the basic measures at all times:**



- > Keep your distance
- > Wear a face covering
- > Cough into your elbow
- > Wash your hands
- > Adapt your greetings

April transfers: Volume continues strong



Real Estate

Note: The following article relates to the registration of deeds of sale for Westmount property in April 2020. A list of sales can be found on p. 18.

Volume surged in April this year in terms of real estate closings, as buyers signed deeds to purchase 16 single-family dwellings, after averaging only seven per month in the first three months of the year.

The sales ranged in price from \$870,000 for 4473 St. Catherine St. - the secondlowest price and one of only three houses in Westmount to sell below \$1,200,000 so far this year - to \$4,450,000 for 91 Summit Crescent, the highest price for a house in the first four months of 2020. The latter is an elegant transformation of a 1956 bungalow, which was redesigned and basically rebuilt by architect Alain Carle (see January 29, 2013, p. 2).

Between those two extremes were two houses selling between \$3.3 and \$3.4 million, another four between \$2.1 and \$2.6 million and eight others, all well over \$1 million.

The St. Catherine house was the biggest mark-down compared to municipal valuation, 9.5 percent less than valuation. (It is just west of two empty lots being developed into a small apartment complex. See story, p. 9)

The highest mark-up in April was 46.2 percent, involving the second-highest April price, at 526 Mount Pleasant Ave., \$3,350,000.

The average mark-up for the month was 15 percent, down slightly from the averages in February and March but in fact almost equal to the first-quarter average. Average price in April was \$2,153,125, and if the average mark-up is applied to the average 2020 valuation, the price would move up to \$2,229,000.

Condos

Buyers apparently were not interested in signing for condominiums in April, and it would appear there was little interest in buying condos early in 2020, perhaps because of the initial reaction to the pandemic news, even though the higher-thanusual volume among single-family buyers

Other Vic Park businesses unaffected 'Victoria Park Health Club' closes, re-opens on Sherbrooke as 'The Studio MTL'

The Victoria Park Health Club has closed, the Independent learned last week, although the business' owner, Val Desjardins, was quick to point out that her business was only named after the large, multitenant building on Victoria Ave. near Sherbrooke. "Victoria Park as a building is still there and running."

"The business model [of our gym] as it

was was not sustainable," she told the Independent by phone October 5. She never re-opened in person after the spring lockdown, although trainers continued to work via Zoom, and she has now "reimbursed every single client."

She has re-opened in a smaller (5,000 vs 20,000 square feet), "much more COVID-friendly" space "for the next year,

at least," where North Face boutique used to be on Sherbrooke near Prince Albert. The new site is called The Studio MTL and trainers are again working via Zoom as Desiardins awaited word from the provincial government on conditions and regulations before opening the new facility.

shows that they didn't seem to be worried about the coronavirus. In some of the deeds, notaries wrote that they had been "signed remotely" and the deeds later confirmed in person.

Processing of deeds by city hall revealed two more sales in November 2019, including by far the highest-priced sale of that year, as the massive 4300 de Maisonneuve Blvd. complex changed hands from a Vancouver-based holding company to an Ottawa-based group, the Minto Apartment Limited Partnership, for \$192,360,000, almost double its 2017 valuation. Another sale involved a garage behind houses on Holton Ave. between Wood and Elm Aves., continued on p. 20

Renaud's new book hot off the press 'Superpower' wins over dislike of Brussels sprouts

A little girl named Albertine Petit-Brin-

damour hates Brussels sprouts, although she thinks they're great for playing mini-golf and marbles or making snowmen's eyes. Anything, that is, but eating. And she's quick at finding them when mixed in with green beans, broccoli, eggs in an omelette or even camouflaged in mashed potatoes.

That's the subject of Anne Renaud's latest children's book, hot off the press September 16 called Albertine Petit-Brindamour déteste les choux Bruxelles. This is at least the tenth children's book from the prolific Westmount author in either English or French or both.

Favourite food: muffins

And just like the subject of some of her other stories for kids targeting ages 5 to 8, this one was inspired by one of her nieces, this time one who was "a bit picky" about sprouts. Renaud set out to find a solution and ended up doing a fair amount of research on what parents might

do to encourage kids to eat the veggie.

"Because one of my niece's favourite foods is muffins, I thought that might make the sprouts irresistible," she said. And it was. "When they were mixed in with grated carrot and honey, they tasted more like carrot muffins," she explained.

And this led to the story in which Albertine's mother tries to tempt her into eating

Once emeralds and even



green like Albertine's favourite superheroes. Who knows, she suggests, maybe they will give her a superpower?

Cooking up a superpower

So with that on her mind, Albertine goes to bed wondering about the superpower and then combs through her mother's recipe books until she finds Brussels sprouts muffins to make. As they

cooled, she gobbles one then another and another, waiting to see what sort of superpower will result.

Suddenly she doesn't feel so well but as she lets out a big fart that startles her cat, she's left with a huge smile at her newfound superpower.

A recipe, modified and taste-tested, is included at the end of the book, which is now available at Westmount Public Library by reserving to pick up at the curbside service, according to children's librarian Wendy Wayling.

Published by La courte échelle in Montreal, every page is brightly illustrated by Élodie Duhameau, who turns Brussels sprouts into little green faces laughing and stickling out their tongues. The company also owns the English rights, although there is no plan for an English edition at present.

Mr. Crum's Potato Predicament. Renaud's award winning book from the Canadian Writer's Feder-

ation in 2018, was read last month by Julie Andrews (of Mary Poppins) and her daughter on their podcast www.julies libraryshow.org/episode/2020/08/12.

Renaud, who works at city hall as executive assistant to Mayor Christina Smith, said she has two more French books and one in English awaiting publication in 2021.

about the challenge of writing in 2020.

Pandemic reality

For the past 15 years, Siré has written poetry, fiction, essays and reviews full time. But she explained: "Back in March as the pandemic was developing, I was too anxious and distracted to write." However, when the Montreal Review of Books asked her to review two books of poetry, she said yes.

As a child, Siré was encouraged by her mother to write reviews of the books that she read. Among her published works, reviews for Arc Poetry and Montreal Serai as well as the Montreal Review of Books. Reviewing POP by Simina Banu and The Loudest Thing by Joshua Levy - published in their Summer 2020 edition - enabled her to re-engage with her own creative writing.

The summer proved to be productive for the author. Siré worked with an editor on a upcoming book of poetry and with a translator on The Other Oscar. She was also interviewed for an essay on her literary work to be published in the Central European Journal of Canadian Studies. She commented: "Being creative is good for your soul. Trying to do something or taking a workshop distances us from our anxieties or the situation that we find ourselves in."

Industry adaptation

In the past, Siré has given readings of her work at literary events across Canada and in New England, as well as at Concordia and a university in Slovenia. "But this spring," she said, "one by one my engagements were cancelled." However as literary events went online, Siré's slated performance with Gloria Macher at the Festival de Poésie de Montréal evolved into a video-poem.

But the pandemic - and social distancing – also entered the author's imagination when she questioned: "Are my characters getting too close?" Siré said: "The Westmount Public Library and Atwater Library were a lifeline to me - keeping me thinking and reading." She also praised Argo Bookshop: "They are great supporters of local talent and local readers."

A creative-writing coach, her advice for those seeking publication is to submit to literary journals and writing competitions. Siré has been a finalist several times and was shortlisted for the Paragraphe Hugh MacLennan Prize for Fiction in 2017 offered by the Quebec Writer's Federation.

She explained: "The challenge of work-

ing with deadlines and length constraints forces writers to be succinct and use language that is compact and compelling."

Creative resiliance

Beginning October 6, Siré will present an online, eight-week creative-writing workshop for the Quebec Writer's Federation. Her advice to novices: "Writing is magical, and if you keep it up and work hard, you will see great results." Her final comment for these trying times:

"And don't be afraid!"
