## Library awaits results of back-to-school before going to 'stage 3'

As back-to-school timing has many families facing uncertainty, further steps in re-opening the Westmount Public Library are on hold pending concerns over a possible spike in new coronavirus cases, library director Julie-Anne Cardella said last week.

"The council wants us to take a cautious approach," she said. This means waiting until numbers of new COVID cases are "under control" once the results of back-to-school are known before moving to a stage-3 step. This could involve opening up the library to members for browsing, at least on a limited, reservation basis.

While some libraries in the Montreal area have already taken this step, Cardella said it involves a number of procedures

that include placing any book or document touched in a 72-hour decontamination period and wiping down anything touched, including a chair or even its seat. This would require a cleaner.

As it is, the entrance to the library allows for members to pick up material they have reserved (see story July 14, p. 3). Some 300 to 500 reservations a day are being processed, Cardella said. For example, on Monday morning August 24, a total of 499 reservations had been received over the weekend.

### Chairs must be fastened to floor

While the Quebec government has allowed seated gatherings of up to 250 people, Cardella said this requires all seats to be fixed to the floor, ..... which in most cases can- *continued on p. 9*

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
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
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

## Virtual public consultation for heritage site set for Sept. 16

A public consultation meeting on the heritage house at 178 Côte St. Antoine will take place Wednesday, September 16. This will be presented at 7 pm as a virtual presentation by Urban Planning's Local Heritage Council using YouTube Live through the city's website.

# Fun Academy renovation to allow for 60 at daycare

After some three years of manoeuvring through the Quebec process for daycare operations, Garderie Fun Academy at Westmount Park Church was set to start extensive reconstruction work this week in its basement quarters to accommodate 60 kids starting in January.

“We’re expecting to be full,” said owner and operator Jacinthe Deschênes, who has

been operating a mini-version of the daycare for up to six children at the church.

“We’re very excited,” she added. “We’re starting with demolishing the basement space, re-doing and upgrading the electricity, air exchange and air conditioning systems, building eight classrooms modelled as a children’s museum and adding a second washroom.”

The work also includes building a staircase to a secondary exit/entrance into

Westmount Park through the east stone wall of the church, a Category I heritage building, for which the city had already approved permits (see story December 5, 2017, p. 1).

### Red tape

This was just before the project became caught up in provincial government red tape: a change in the Quebec family ministry’s daycare regulations, the 2018 provincial election and legal action by Deschênes.

Until a legal ruling at the end of last year cleared the way for Fun Academy to operate a full-sized, private, non-subsidized daycare (see story November 19, 2019, p. 1), its mini-version for up to six children has been operating at the church but had to close down from March 13 to July 1 over the pandemic.

Since then, and during the renovation period, it will operate on the main floor of the church, which remains closed over COVID to other activities such as Contactivity.

While there were other daycare applications left in limbo over similar challenges, “we’re the only one that went through the

battle and survived,” she said.

### A children’s museum

The daycare is being modelled as a children’s museum. Themed classrooms are to include a science lab, space ship, forest, octopus’ garden under the sea, artist studio and farmers’ vegetable market. “There will be a lot of pretend play.”

These are being planned by an Alberta company that provides designs for children’s hospitals, Deschênes said. The daycare is also being modelled as an outdoor one and has affiliated with the UK Forest School provider, she said.

“This is a program that creates outdoor education. It focusses on three hours a day outdoors “for which we will be using the whole park, not just the playground.” In addition to CEGEP certified daycare educators, she said, there will be part-time specialists to teach piano, science and other areas.

## Tent ruled out for public attendance at council meeting Sept. 8

These have not been open to public attendance since the closure of city hall March 13 over the COVID-19 pandemic.

The upcoming meeting will be accessible from the city website. Because of the holiday on Labour Day Monday, the meeting will be held on Tuesday.

### Council approves 15 permits, refuses none

The following 15 requests for demolition, exterior construction, alteration or renovation were approved at the August 17 meeting of the city council on the recommendation of the Planning Advisory Committee (PAC). There were no refusals.

**26 Melbourne:** landscaping work at the front, side and rear, including repaving the parking apron and building a new terrace and patio at the rear provided the parking apron is reduced to a maximum width of 17 feet which is the width protected by vested rights as per the city archives;

**4260 Dorchester:** to build a back terrace in a new configuration provided a soffit in wood is installed below the terrace;

**479 Strathcona:** to do landscaping work in the front yard, including repaving the driveway provided the retaining walls are made of, or faced in, natural stone;

**344 Victoria:** to rebuild the storefront;

**48 Aberdeen:** to replace windows provided the leading is applied on the interior and exterior of the exterior pane of glass;

**430 Grosvenor:** to repair the rear balconies with conditions concerning the handrail

and uprights and that a soffit in wood be installed under the balconies;

**39 Côte St. Antoine:** at a Category I\* house, to do landscaping in the front and side yards;

**317 Roslyn:** to rebuild the main entrance porch and stairs;

**421 Victoria:** to replace the front second-storey door on conditions the proportions of the doors and the transom are revised so that the transom has the same height as the neighbour's at 425-427 Victoria;

**20 Sunnyside:** to replace some windows provided two designated windows are double-hung ones;

**5 Côte St. Antoine:** at a Category I house to replace the front door provided the details in the transom are preserved or replicated to be identical to the existing;

**655 Côte St. Antoine:** to repair the front stairs;

**464 Elm:** at a Category I house, to replace the front stairs of wood by concrete;

**4937 Sherbrooke:** at a Category I house, to install a sign for a new commercial tenant.

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

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**Police Report****Police warn of school safety blitz until end of September – watch your driving**

With many school children back in class after summer vacation and following the COVID-19 hiatus, police at Station 12 are warning they will be watching extra closely for motorists who speed through school zones or fail to obey safety regulations when school buses are stopped for students.

**Closer scrutiny**

According to Station 12 community relations officer Stéphan Laperrière, school zones will be under closer scrutiny by the police over the next few weeks.

“With the majority of schools opening, the police presence around schools in Westmount is going up,” said Laperrière, noting that the police will be conducting special operations near Westmount’s schools for about a month.

Among other things, he said officers

will be keeping an eye out for parents who fail to drop off or pick up children outside schools in an orderly way, or cause traffic jams by double-parking. He warned that tickets will be issued by the police if deemed necessary.

**Warnings – maybe**

“Usually, the police officers will start off with warnings,” he said. “But if a warning is given out one day, it doesn’t mean there’ll be a second warning on day two. The police officers will be using their own judgement and will decide whether to give out a warning or a fine.”

Laperrière said motorists can expect to see police officers stationed near schools, especially during peak hours when students are arriving and leaving at the end of the school day, from August 31 until the end of September.

not be done in the library or Victoria Hall. The library is also closely following recommendations from the Quebec Library Association, she explained.

This also applies to Victoria Hall, which will only be used for now, at least, for some of the Sports and Recreation programs (see separate story p. 1).

To prepare for the eventual move to stage 3, the library is ordering wrap-around Plexiglas shields for the circulation, reference, children’s and A/V desks, according to Cardella.

These have an installation date of up to

five weeks away, which could be expected to coincide with at least the early results of the back-to-school process.

Another area of concern is use of the library computers and their related furniture, which also would require rigorous wiping down.

The library staff is operating on a two-team system with the teams rotating but never overlapping so that if one should be quarantined due to suspected COVID, it would not affect the entire staff. This is the same procedure being used by Public Works to prevent immobilizing the department.

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## Sports and Rec reviews summer programs

# COVID-free and deemed a success, Lapointe says

As Sports and Recreation officials turn their sights to fall programs, a look at the summer activities featuring pool use, day camps and other activities reveals that all the pandemic social distancing, scaled-back capacities and other planning measures paid off.

"We've had no cases of COVID, knock on wood," department director Dave Lapointe told the *Independent* last week as two weeks remained. No cases meant among users, lifeguards, counsellors or other workers, despite the experience of some other municipal pools forced to close

when staff were affected by cross-contamination.

So was the season a success? "Absolutely," he replied. Users "were very compliant. We had a few phone calls of complaints regarding the pool reservation system, but the system is what it is."

With pool capacity reduced to 75 from 350 for general swim, most of the spaces were filled, although there were some cases where people did not cancel and simply didn't show up. The pool was able to maintain the lap and adult swim periods as well as aquafit. No lessons were provided.

Lapointe said he considered the day

camp to be a success. The four two-week sessions provided a total of 280 spots at the required half capacity. While most were filled, not all, which Lapointe did not find surprising. "A lot of parents were timid to [have their children] participate and, with so many people working from home, their kids were able to stay there."

### New activities introduced

And out of pandemic needs came the introduction of new activities in Westmount Park - fitness, yoga, tai chi and "groove dance." They proved so successful that they were extended a couple of weeks and will likely be held again next summer, Lapointe said. "It's something we had always intended to do."

The opening of the arena July 13 for private evening hockey rental also was successful under reduced capacity while general skating and hockey were also introduced and the city's own hockey camp took place last week.

Meanwhile finishing touches were being added to the arena's fall program (see separate story, p. 1).

Fitness-type programs, some also live-streamed, and karate are expected to be the only other Sports and Recreation programs taking place at the WRC along with hockey and skating.

All others will be run at Victoria Hall, for which several changes were still taking place last week after some instructors decided to opt out, he said.

### Hockey pods

"Youth hockey is just instructional and will be broken down into pods of 20 according to age and ability. All ice time will be divided into hourly periods allowing for 45 minutes between each for sanitizing

and cleaning up. Overall, we'll be losing about 35 percent of usable ice time," Lapointe estimated.

Adult hockey will resemble the Old Timers league organized as pick-up games. "Players will be divided into pods of 20 guys playing 4-on-4 (plus goalies) that will stay the same and play against each other with players bringing a light or dark coloured sweater" to differentiate the team they'll play on.

### Skating instruction

Skating instruction also will change with 20 participants reduced from the usual 60. Beginners will be organized in groups of five.

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
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Groupe Maurice project at foot of Claremont in NDG

## Excavation to start in October for new seniors' residence

Excavation and soil decontamination is now set to start in October followed about five months later by construction of the 10-storey Groupe Maurice seniors' residence on the vacant lot on de Maisonneuve and St. Catherine at the foot of Claremont in NDG.

While soil testing had begun in January, with an aim to start the work in May, the updated schedule was reported last week by Sarah Ouellette, spokesperson for

Groupe Maurice, which is developing the complex called LIZ. It includes 336 apartments with services as well as 24 care-provided studio apartments.

"Fortunately, COVID-19 has not caused any delays or changes to our project," she told the *Independent*.

The call period for tenders and proposals of the bids, however, had been extended due to several sub-contractors not being available during May, she explained. "Financing authorizations were also longer

than forecasted."

### Work at Westmount side?

Ouellette said it had not yet been decided whether any of the work would take place from the St. Catherine side of the property at the border of Westmount. "It will be coordinated with the contractor."

The permit for the building had been received February 28 after several years in the approval process involving Montreal and the borough of Côte des Neiges-NDG.

Previous plans in a joint venture with Proviso included a grocery store at ground level (see story March 3, 2015, p. 1). When the store was opposed by nearby residents concerned about added traffic, the vacant property was purchased from Proviso by Groupe Maurice to continue the development on its own (see story March 26, 2019, p. RE-3).

Much to her delight Goddard was notified of the project's acceptance on August 17.



from the 1840s, is protected by the city's own 1\* heritage rating, the proposed provincial designation covering all aspects, including the interior, has been described as making it the first private residence in Quebec to be so protected.

The landmark stone house on the south side of the Côte road is located just west of

Forde Ave. and is characterized by its low pyramidal roof with large eaves and British garrison-like appearance. It is one of four that had been known as Metcalfe Terrace. While only two now exist, this one is reported to be relatively untouched.

Its preserved interior is attributed to the fact that it had been in the Goode family for more than 135 years.

**DANGER IN THE POOL: SWIMMERS!**

The opening of the Westmount pool has made the summer hugely enjoyable for many of us. The scheduling has worked well; the guards are attentive and polite, and there doesn’t seem to have been any COVID incidents. Unfortunately, the good news is marred by what appears to be an increasing number of selfish, dangerous swimmers.

Over the past few weeks, I have been struck eight times, mostly by swimmers who have no sense of courtesy. They behave as if they were alone in the pool. This is most evident when they swim backstroke and repeatedly collide with those around them – even in an adjacent lane. As well, there are those who use flippers and swim too fast to avoid collisions. Then

we have those who ignore the six-person limit and social distancing rules.

Often offenders are far heavier than most others – especially folks like me. Thus, when a collision occurs, the hurt inflicted can be severe. It is only a matter of time when someone will be concussed by colliding with a 200-pounder going full throttle. When reprimanded by the guards or by other swimmers, offenders are often aggressive and abusive.

I urge that, when the pool re-opens, serious consideration be given to separating those who insist on swimming in a socially irresponsible manner from the rest of us who simply want to be able to enjoy a pleasant, relaxing swim. It is not just COVID that poses a danger for the elderly.

PS – I also note that many fail to shower or insist that their kids do so.

**THANKS FOR THE BIKE PATH, PEDESTRIAN BOLLARDS ON LANSDOWNE**

Our association wants to thank the city for adding some plastic posts (bollards) along the Lansdowne bike path between Westmount Ave. and Sherbrooke St.

Since the bike path was initially added a couple of years ago, it has proved very popular with commuters on their way to the de Maisonneuve or the Lachine canal bike paths and with families on their way to the Lachine canal bike path for an outing. The bike counter on the Lansdowne bike path in front of the Westmount recreation centre (WRC) regularly records almost 1,500 cyclists per day on weekends.

Since the arrival of COVID, we have also noticed many more new cyclists around Westmount out for exercise or avoiding public transportation – so making bike paths safe for those new inexperienced cyclists is important.

The initial bike path design consisted of a painted line without any form of protection, so drivers would often drive, stop or park in the bike path, thereby compromising the safety of cyclists. The vehicle traffic also erased the painted line that identified the bike path. Since the bollards have been added, many more drivers are respecting the path and the safety of the cyclists using it. Unfortunately, due to the high number of driveways, the city was not able to install many bollards – but a few is much better than none!

We also want to thank the city for installing bollards beside the east sidewalk on Lansdowne between Sherbrooke St. and de Maisonneuve to make that narrow sidewalk safer for the many ..... pedestrians who use it *continued on p. 21*

daily. Many seniors walk along that sidewalk for exercise or to go to Contactivity. Many families walk on that sidewalk to go to the WRC.

Because the driving lanes are not wide, when cars and trucks cross paths, the north-bound vehicles ended up driving right beside the narrow sidewalk, making the pedestrians feel unsafe. By adding the bollards, a couple of feet from the sidewalk, drivers are kept away from pedestrians on the sidewalk. Also, the bollards make the driving lane narrower, which helps slow down traffic thereby making pedestrians

safer.

We appreciate that the city is implementing these measures to make vulnerable pedestrians and cyclists safer.

PS – Also, thanks to the city for cutting the ragweed plants in lanes – a big relief for people with ragweed allergies!

## March transfers: Two over \$3 million

at 12 Windsor Ave., just west of Victoria Ave.

A stately brick detached house on Sherbrooke St. near the corner of Mount Stephen Ave. sold for 80 percent more than its municipal assessment, the highest mark-up in March, while 26 Melbourne Ave., corner Melville Ave., sold just under its tax value, for \$2,140,000. That house is now under complete renovation.

### Condos

Only two condominiums sold in March, both in re-divided older (by Westmount standards) buildings, first a portion of the mansion at 202 Côte St. Antoine Rd., corner Mount Stephen Ave., which has been made into a townhouse-type condominium (sale price \$1,915,000); next, a portion of the duplex at 482 Victoria Ave. (\$875,000). Those two sales bring to nine the number transferred in the first quarter of 2020, ranging from \$599,000 for a flat at 350 Grosvenor Ave. in February to \$2,030,000 for a fifth-storey apartment at 1 Wood Ave in January.

The average mark-up of the March home sales – including the duplex at 445-47 Victoria Ave. – was 26.8 percent compared to the *continued on p. 25*

A share of the duplex at 432-34 Prince Albert Ave. cleared the \$1-million mark as well, providing the rights to 434 Prince Albert.
