City opposes agglo's Namur-Hippodrome development loan as 'unlawful'

An "extraordinary" meeting of city council took place February 20 without much advance notice. It was held to officially register Westmount's opposition to a Montreal agglomeration's \$20-million loan by-law for financing acquisition of land as part of its Namur-Hippodrome project. This is the site of the former Blue Bonnets race track west of the Decarie autoroute and north of Côte St. Luc and Hampstead.

The city's resolution allocates \$5,000 in "preliminary expenses" related to contesting the Montreal by-law by the demerged "suburbs" (the Association of Suburban Municipalities), Mayor Christina Smith told the *Independent*.

The hastily called Westmount meeting to oppose the agglomeration's loan by-law resulted from legal timelines, she said. No members of the public attended. Mayor Smith was present along with councillors Matt Aronson, Mary Gallery, Conrad Smith and Jeff Shamie.

Westmount's resolution involved an application to Superior Court to annul the Montreal by-law based on it being vague, incomplete and "an unlawful sub-delegation of powers and without overview limits."

The mandated legal firm for the city is Prévost, Fortin, D'Aoust Avocats.

The long talked about Namur-Hippodrome development has been described by Montreal mayor Valérie Plante as a "city within a city."

Infrastructure loans approved

City registers fail to attract required numbers for citizen challenge

Two loan by-laws enabling the city to borrow a total of \$5,656,190 were deemed approved following two days of open registers for qualified voters to sign requests to hold a referendum for either.

The separate referendum registers were open at the same time to be signed by qualified voters who wanted a referendum.

A minimum of 1,415 signatures per bylaw would have been required for reconsideration by the council.

Only two were received for each by-law. One by-law, number 1627 in the amount of \$3,009,000, concerned work on public stairs.

The other, number 1628, was for \$2,647,190 for work on municipal buildings (see story January 28, p. 1).

Session explores criteria for felling trees

Public consultation on tree by-law attracts few questions

A public consultation meeting to revise the city's tree by-law February 25 attracted some 10 attendees in the council chamber to hear a presentation by Urban Planning director Frédéric Neault lasting some 30 minutes.

The desire for updating the city's by-law was to better protect the city's urban canopy especially at construction sites, he explained, as well as to reduce effects of heat islands along with a number of details regarding tree planting, maintenance and removal.

Among some of the points highlighted by Neault were the need to install a protective fence around trees at a construction site, and changing the minimum distance of a newly planted tree to a building from five to three meters.

Others include that, for the removal of an unhealthy tree, a specialist must provide a certificate stating it should be removed and that when one is, it must be replaced. As well, a list of trees that cannot be planted was provided.

Questions included those from local landscape architect Sophie Robitaille on a number of technical points, and protection of trees on heritage properties from both John Fretz of Lansdowne and Jon Breslaw of Grosvenor.

While fines of some \$2,500 for felling a tree was described by Breslaw as "peanuts" when it comes to a heritage property such as the Goode House at 178 Côte St. Antoine, Neault explained that this was the maximum allowed by Quebec.

The revised by-law presented at the meeting was already on the city's website during the meeting.

Revised draft by-law


Among meeting attendees who did not ask questions was Frank Philpott, of Claremont, who had raised questions previously about a number of large trees that had been removed from the on-going construction site at 500 Claremont, leaving neighbouring properties without the privacy that residents had previously expected. He had shown poster-size photos of the tree cutting results at the council meeting January 13.

This, he had also explained, was contrary to what had been presented by the Planning Advisory Committee (PAC) at an initial meeting of the construction project—namely that the many large trees would not be removed.

Last week, he said after the recent meeting that he intended to "continue to press Westmount to see that they force the owner of this construction site to replace the trees as the project nears completion."

Approval of the proposed revised text is scheduled for presentation at the March 17 council meeting.

Are they just messing with us now?



These signs put up by the city of Montreal or its contractors are visible to westbound motorists on Sherbrooke just before Elm. The one at left is correct, since Wood above Sherbrooke is currently southbound only due to Montreal's work (see February 18, p. 4) so westbound drivers cannot turn right onto it. But why talk about "Wood Nord" and "Wood Sud"? They don't exist as streets and "Wood" on its own would be perfectly descriptive. The whole length of Wood is reachable by turning right on Elm, then right on Holton and then right at the top of Wood. The sign at right makes no sense. Yes, one could get to Wood by going straight and eventually getting back to Wood "nord," but they could just as truthfully put "Vancouver."

INDOOR POOL COSTS, RUNNING COSTS WOULD BE WORTH IT

The opposition to an indoor swimming pool in Westmount (February 25, p. 6) is sad and dismisses the long-term benefits that such a facility would provide to the entire community. A well-planned indoor swimming pool is not merely a luxury. It is a vital community asset that promotes health, fitness recreation and social engagement for residents of all ages.

A prime example of the success and necessity of an indoor swimming pool can be found in Côte St. Luc. Its aquatic facility operates seven days a week, from 6 am to 9 pm, serving a wide range of community members, including seniors, children, competitive swimmers and individuals seeking low-impact exercise for rehabilitation. Despite its \$2-million annual maintenance cost, the community overwhelmingly supports it due to the immense value it provides.

The cost of constructing an indoor pool is often misrepresented as an insurmountable financial burden. However, Côte St. Luc's facility, built in 2011, cost \$18.4 million, which included not just the pool but also community rooms, gym facilities, conference spaces and recreational areas. Out of this total, \$11 million was funded by the federal and provincial governments, while the city [of Côte St. Luc] contributed only \$6 million. This demonstrates that with proper planning and financial structuring,

such a project is not only feasible but also beneficial.

Criticism regarding municipal debt and financial feasibility must be addressed with factual analysis rather than fearmongering. Cities across Quebec, including those comparable to Westmount, invest in infrastructure that enhances residents' quality of life. Borrowing for a well-justified, widely beneficial project like an indoor swimming pool aligns with responsible urban planning. Questions about debt benchmarking and financial metrics are important but should not be weaponized to hinder progress. Municipal investments must be evaluated in terms of long-term returns and community well-being rather than short-term financial caution.

The notion that city land should be sold instead of being used for recreational purposes contradicts the very essence of community development. Public land is meant to serve the people, and an indoor swimming pool would do just that – offering a year-round venue for physical activity, community engagement and well-being.

Westmount has the opportunity to enhance its community services in a meaningful and sustainable way. An indoor pool is not an extravagant wish but a necessary investment in the health and cohesion of the city. Proper financial planning and [non-municipal] government grants can make this project a reality without compromising other municipal responsibilities. It is time to prioritize community needs over

rigid financial conservatism and embrace a vision that benefits all residents for generations to come.

ACTION NEEDED TO BUTTRESS TALK OF SUSTAINABILITY

Mayor Smith's declaration on February 4 regarding Westmount's response to US tariffs on Canadian products is a step in the right direction. Her call to "remain united" and "build a prosperous and sustainable future for all of us" is certainly inspiring. However, such motivational proclamations lack the concrete action necessary to generate significant change.

What is the city doing specifically to foster a sustainable future? As a former

member of the city's Environmental and Sustainability Advisory Committee (ESAC), I requested more detailed information last fall to better understand its existing sustainable practices, particularly in procurement policies. Does the city prioritize local, Canadian-made products when issuing tenders? Is there a point system to incentivize businesses that adopt sustainable practices?

I'm uncertain whether ESAC has received any of the requested information. Despite my repeated requests, most of the ESAC minutes remain unavailable online. At the time of writing, the only minutes accessible are from September, even though the committee has met at least five times since then.

I again raised my concerns to council and eventually received a response from Councillor D'Amico. Unfortunately, his reply indicated that, "Local supplier preference... is limited due to interprovincial and international trade agreements." It is unclear why this is the case and why the city is unable to adopt its own more progressive policies on this matter.

Beyond procurement policies, Westmount's building and zoning by-laws are outdated and in dire need of reform. Why is the city not providing incentives to favour locally-made or sourced building products? In fact, current city policies sometimes discourage such efforts.

Example: I recently assisted a friend with a permit request to install a new slate roof, only to face a lengthy battle with the city to allow for local Quebec tiles from the last remaining slate quarry in our province.

Westmount's permit department had insisted on using an American-sourced slate because of a very slight variation in hue. After much effort, including a plea for support from our local MNA, the city finally relented – though they insisted the approval was exceptional as they could not find archival evidence of the original slate colour from over a century ago.

While the city has made small steps in the right direction – from banning woodburning appliances and gasoline-powered leaf blowers, to improving waste collection practices – council needs to do more. It's time to move from inspirational rhetoric to tangible action.

CLAREMONT AREA NEEDS PARKING, NOT UNUSED **BIKE PATHS**

Open letter to Conrad Peart, councillor for District 4

I apologize for being late to comment on this important issue [i.e. the plan to reconstruct Claremont above Sherbrooke this year]. I missed the earlier citizen input sessions.

While we all know that the renewal of Claremont infrastructure is long overdue. this "preferred" scenario [as the city described it] is unrealistic. An important question is: "Preferred by whom?"

The most pressing issue to me and many others is the addition of a bicycle lane and the removal of multiple parking spots. Has anyone from the council or the administration actually spent any time observing activity on Claremont and the adjoining streets (primarily Chesterfield and Windsor)? The evidence would indi-

For those of us who live in terraced houses with no parking aprons, daily parking (for which privilege we pay) is already extremely challenging. Clearly, the council does not care. I presume most have their own driveways and parking aprons.

While much of the plan looks good, the bound-to-be-underused bicycle path and reduced parking will cause major hardship to many residents, and to customers of the businesses on Sherbrooke St.

If I were in charge, I would add a couple of speed cameras.* This would eliminate speeding by cars, at least. Significantly large speed bumps should reduce the only real bicycle-related issue on Claremont: cyclists speeding downhill and endangering pedestrians and themselves. A dedicated bicycle path is definitely not needed for those same cyclists to push their cycles up the very steep hill.

Please be realistic in fixing this issue. Think common sense, not catering to some impractical ideal by the small but vocal bicycle lobby. Think about the average Westmount citizen. We need those parking spaces. Thank you.

FEDERAL LIBERALS FOCUSED ON WEALTH RE-DISTRIBUTION, **NOT CREATION**

I recently received in the mail as, no doubt most Westmounters did, a communication from Anna Gainey, our Liberal member of parliament. With a federal election imminent, I guess she decided it was time she showed up.

After a platitudinous introduction, Gainey continued with a litany of programmes that the government had freshly minted or augmented. Some are good programmes. There was not, however, a single word about what the government had done or was proposing to pay for all this. That is no doubt because in fact they have done little or nothing. The cost was simply added to

the ridiculously underestimated deficit and ballooning national debt. They turn to taxes as the solution. An attempt was made to raise taxes on capital gains, a move so universally criticized by economists and taxpayers alike that even the government saw fit to put it on pause.

There were no references either to any efforts to spur wealth creation and productivity in this country. Again because there were none. This government is ideologically focused on wealth redistribution, not creation. Wealth creation generates more tax revenue (without raising rates), which helps defray the cost of social programmes.

In another section, Gainey gave the CBC a rave review and intimated that a significant increase in funding over and above the \$1.3 billion or so that taxpayers already contribute annually to this partially commercial organization was in the offing. While there may well be a place for some form of public broadcasting, it is widely acknowledged that the CBC model is broken and needs to be drastically restructured. I look forward to public discussion on various possible scenarios regarding this issue.

the beginning of the season. His commitment to putting in the work is the kind of quality the association "wants to encourage in all their players – taking pride in the role and encouraging others."


A comparable NHL player, according to Jay-Riendeau: goaltender Logan Thompson of the Washington Capitals.





October transfers versus September: Like night and day

Note: The following article relates to the registration of deeds of sale for Westmount property in October 2024 gleaned from city sources. A list of sales can be found on p. 15.

It was like night and day.

The average price of 12 Westmount house closings signed in September last year was \$1,692,114. In October, the next 13 sales to be registered averaged \$3,365,192, very close to double the price.

In fact, in August the average was \$3,411,923 and in July it was \$3,907,000, the second-highest average in Westmount's history (after \$5,751,250 in October 2022,

thanks to the \$23,000,000 purchase of 9 Gordon Crescent that month).

Nevertheless, it might be said that the prices have been fairly steady through most of 2024; overall the average mark-up is 8.4 percent, in October it was 9.4 percent.

The October average is made up of several noteworthy Westmount houses, including the top price at 4332 Westmount Ave., corner Argyle Ave., which sold for \$7,500,000, 18.9 percent higher than the municipal valuation.

The next-highest price of \$4,980,000 went for 55 Belvedere Rd., the original house on Belvedere that is a little north of Belvedere Circle, which sold for 16.1 percent less than valuation, October's biggest mark-down.

\$2,000 Louis Vuitton purse stolen from Vic village boutique

A brazen act of theft last week at a highend Victoria village fashion boutique will likely serve to remind local merchants that their expensive wares are continually at risk of being stolen by determined and underhanded shoplifters.

Investigators at the Montreal police department's Station 12 on Stanton St. estimated the value of the Louis Vuitton purse taken during the February 20 incident at around \$2,000.

At around 4 pm that day, according to a criminal incident report, a male suspect entered the Charlotte & Gabrielle designer consignment store on Prince Albert Ave. near the corner of Somerville Ave. and approached the salesperson.

"The suspect walked in, asked to look at the bag, and as he was looking at the bag, when he had an opportunity, he ran out," said Station 12 community relations officer Cst. Mike Yigit.

The suspect, whose approximate age could not be determined, was described as being about six feet tall and wearing a long khaki-coloured coat with fur around the collar.

Passports stolen from car

The owner of a car parked on Burton Ave. that was broken into and robbed recently is likely to think twice from now on about storing personal identification documents in the glove box.

According to the incident report, five passports were stolen from the car, which was parked in the owner's driveway.

"They had left the passports in the glove compartment and they are now gone," said Cst. Yigit.

The owner only realized the passports were missing after several weeks had passed, he added.

In keeping with a protocol of under-

the corner of Roslyn Ave., just opposite the Westmount Baptist Church. Another \$4 million-plus sale involved 662-64 Victoria Ave., a very large semi-detached house that includes a separate garage (664 Victoria) with living quarters above it.

Condos

On the other hand, all five condominium sales in October had prices lower than

\$1 million, but most had mark-ups over 10 percent. The previous three months had recorded 18 sales with an average price of \$1,089,472, nine over \$1 million and a top price of \$2,700,000, so the October list indicated a serious drop in demand for condos.

The latest list of sales adds one more house sold in September, a garage space at 1 Wood Ave., which went for a cool \$88,000, and a commercial property at 328 Victoria Ave., which sold for \$1,500,000.

standing between the Montreal police department and its federal counterparts, the Canada Border Services Agency was notified that the passports were no longer in the hands of their rightful bearers.

Civic found

There was at least a bit of good news from police at Station 12 last week.

A 2008 Honda Civic, which was reported stolen after being towed from NDG to Westmount during a snow removal operation (see February 25, p. 4), was recovered by its owner.

While the owner initially reported to police that he was unable to find the car, which had been towed to a parking spot on Sherbrooke St. around Westmount Park, he later informed them that he had located the vehicle a little further along Sherbrooke.



The Montreal Museum of Fine Arts has an exciting new exhibition: the world premiere of *Joyce Weiland: Heart On*.

The artist's retrospective was co-organized by the Art Gallery of Ontario (AGO) and the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts (MMFA). Co-curators Georgiana Uhlyarik, curator of Canadian Art, AGO, and Anne Grace, curator of modern art, MMFA, were present at the opening, along with the MMFA's director Stéphane Aquin, Mary-Dailey Desmarais, MMFA chief curator, and Jo-Anne Duchesne, director general, MMFA Foundation.

The multi-talented Weiland worked in many media. Let me count the ways: film, graphic design, quilting, embroidery, oil painting, plastics and wonderfully delicate pencil drawings. And talk about tactile! Her textures include shiny plastics, alluring latex, warm woolly knitting and sensuous "lipsticked" kisses.

Born in Toronto, she lived in New York for a few years with her husband, artist Michael Snow. There, they hosted Pierre Trudeau at a "quilt-in" and she gifted him *La raison avant la passion*, which he then hung at the PM's official residence.

Ever curious, she travelled to the Maritimes, seeking knitters and embroiderers for her work. Adults and children alike will love her wall-to-wall quilt featuring antlered deer. Its low-relief forms are the perfect Canadian "frieze." Not only does Joyce Weiland's shape-shifting work proffer colour – welcome in the daze of greys – her

wit brings smiles. The artist is iconic in the development of visual arts in Canada.

Make time for 'Great Wave'

Weiland's radical art-making requires more than a walk-through. Take time. And then, for something completely different – but hardly a complete unknown – don't miss the world famous *The Great Wave off Kanagawa*.

From the series "Thirty-six views of Mount Fuji" by Japanese artist Hokusai, the woodblock print was created almost 200 years ago. There were once 8,000 copies. Today there are only 100, which are rarely shown due to fragility.


The iconic image teaches us to look. Tiny boats are reduced to diminutive dots under the massive wave. Its immense towering sense of menace is stabilized by the perfect poise of Mount Fuji, the petite peak in the background.

Although the series depicts Fuji, here the wave is the star. "The entire room feels the spray," as Impressionist artist Cezanne once commented on another seascape.

Trauma, Resilience.


Objects from the McCord's native collection are combined with powerful and inspiring text and video testimonies from members of the 11 Indigenous nations in

Nori Bolducci founded her Montreal 2025 Blanket Project to raise awareness of abuse against women.

Inspired by a project she saw in Italy, Nori launched a similar knitting venture in Montreal. However, it is not just the clacking needles and quiet crocheting that caught my eye. It seems to me that the project also offers a retro response, a counterpoint to a world of artificial intelligence and streaming "news."

It is a shape shifter. The gentle – and comforting – craft brings touch to a techdriven life. It enhances – indeed encourages – conversations as groups form to knit together.

Talk also drives awareness of the cause. "We are weaving hope." Knitted or crocheted squares have been dropped off all over Montreal.

Next steps? Nori "curated" the cuddly donations, putting together chromatic collections of the squares (50 cm x 50 cm) from which "blankets" were made. Recently they were assembled by helpful volunteers, including her daughter Emily Chur-






