# City being asked to expand Bixi service

expand the size of some Bixi docking stations in Westmount or consider redistributing the number of bikes to meet current demands, according to some frequent users.

The issue, which is expected to be raised by the Westmount Walking and Cycling Association (WWCA) at the October 1 city council meeting, arises from complaints by its members who find the more popular docking stations empty quickly in the morning and fill up in the evening, leaving no space for returning a bike.

"You only need to be turned away a few times before you say 'forget it, I'll take my car,'" said Dan Lambert, president of the 140-member WWCA.

# Rains, flooding – a historic problem, Indie finds

Frequent heavy rain and flooded basements run far back in Westmount's history, recent research by the *Independent* has revealed.

While a group of residents was expected to press city council October 1 for action to prevent a repeat of the summer's widespread flooding, similar problems and complaints were voiced some 80 years ago, according to official city reports.

"We had several rain storms during the summer with the result that basements were again flooded," stated the city's general manager in an annual report to the city council in 1932.

Preliminary findings show it was a refrain repeated in other city reports throughout the 1930s – long before global

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
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

# 'International' Bixis not so foreign to local fleet

Those colourful Bixis from other cities seen at local docking stations may be adding international flavour to the silver-grey Montreal fleet, but a red and white one from Ottawa certainly took one Westmount user by surprise.

Henry Olders was taken aback one Sunday morning – August 26 – when he tried without success to remove a typical local Bixi from the docking station at Victoria Hall.

Spotting the brightly painted model from Ottawa in the same rack, he came to the conclusion someone had brought it from the nation's capital and, in docking it in a different system, had locked the whole stand down.

Reporting the malfunctioning station, he was told that Bixi was aware there was a problem and would be correcting it.

But by Tuesday, when the Ottawa bike was still docked, his assumptions about the "foreign" bike were reinforced though he did not try to use the station that day.

"It was just a coincidence," Bixi spokesperson Michel Philibert explained last week.

### 'Cool to ride'

In fact, the colourful Bixis sporting "foreign" logos are part of the local fleet, integrated to provide "international flavour," and to demonstrate they are all made in Quebec, he said. "It's kind of cool to ride one." They aren't new, either. It's the second year they've been placed within the fleet.

"I picked one up at Atwater last year from London – or was it Melbourne? – and it was kind of neat," said Dan Lambert, president of the Westmount Walking and Cycling

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


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*Electrification of trains still 'a priority' – or is it?*

# AMT reply seen as opening rapport with city, Westmount Train Action Group

News last week that the Agence métropolitaine de Montréal (AMT) is still targeting electrification of commuter tracks through Westmount is being hailed as “very encouraging” by the Westmount Train Action Group (WTAG).

The AMT’s position was outlined in a two-page letter from interim director Paul Côté September 18 in response to one from Mayor Peter Trent September 10. Former provincial legislator Nicolas Girard was appointed new AMT president September 26.

But on October 1, CN president and CEO Claude Mongeau was widely quoted as saying the project to electrify commuter trains could cost more than double the AMT’s estimates of some \$1.5 billion and was not viable.

The mayor’s letter, written at the request of Columbia Ave. resident Michael Mossop of WTAG, included a plan from the train group to use the Vendôme station

as an off-hour terminus for commuter trains. This would reduce the number of trains proceeding to Lucien L’Allier through Westmount.

While the AMT reply appeared to discount this proposal, “We wanted dialogue and clarification on electrification,” Mossop told the *Independent* last week. “It has given WTAG a voice on the issue.”

The goal of the city letter had been to “flush out” the AMT on its plans, Trent told the council meeting September 10 (see September 18, p. 6). This appears to have been achieved, Mossop said. “What I’m happy about is the way the city did it.”

### Council meeting issue

Mossop planned to present counterarguments to the letter at the city council meeting after press time on October 1.

Electrification has been a key objective of the city and WTAG as a way to reduce noise, vibration and pollution of the trains, which are expected to increase in number.

Information made public less than a

month ago, however, about a decision by CP and CN against electrifying freight trains, generated concern that this would extend to the commuter line. No freight trains, however, travel on these tracks between Lucien L’Allier station and Ville St. Pierre.

Instead, the AMT letter cited electrification as one of the solutions to annoyances experienced by Westmounters and all residents living near the commuter rail line, “a project that remains a priority for the AMT.”

Trent told the *Independent* he felt it was not appropriate for him to comment until the new AMT leadership team is in place.

But Councillor Theodora Samiotis, Environmental commissioner, said she was pleased with the “efficiency” and speed the AMT had shown in communicating with the mayor. “We still feel electrification is a viable solution,” she said.

## Track work vehicles travel north on Victoria Ave.

Public Security officials report receiving a number of complaints September 17 and 18 from residents annoyed by overnight work to build a third railway track in the southwest corner of Westmount.


Work related to its construction had been announced by the city to take place in the late spring or early summer along with measures designed to mitigate disruption.

The work has involved the use of jackhammers as well as dump trucks traveling out of the CP property at St. Catherine and York and heading north on Victoria to Sherbrooke, a public safety officer said.

With access to the Ville Marie and Decarie expressways closed overnight due to the Turcot interchange work, the trucks had no other way to reach the highways than going west on Sherbrooke, officials said.

The track work had to be done at night to protect workers from commuter trains.

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


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

reasons put forward for recent recurring flooding. Even the capacity of St. Henri to handle Westmount's water was also noted, along with the costs of a solution.

The problem "cannot be remedied until we construct a main sewer discharging through the Glen into the Little River St. Pierre Sewer, which is now under construction by the City of Montreal," the same 1932 report continued.

"And we cannot proceed with the con-

the city," stated a report from 1939.

On July 8 that year almost half an inch (12 mm) of rain fell within five minutes for a total of 1.6 inches (40 mm) in 45 minutes. August 7 brought almost the same amount in 40 minutes.

The solution was to install "trunk" (collector) sewers at an average depth of 27 feet. In fact, the first shaft was sunk 29 feet deep on Western Ave. in December 1939. Once again: "to remedy flooding of basements which had occurred in heavy rains."

The "trunk sewer" project continued

Two years later, the work began on a collector sewer "which is part of a scheme to remedy flooding of basements in the lower levels during heavy rain storms," it was explained in another annual report.

## Five-foot diameter sewer

This five-foot diameter sewer was described as running from St. James (now St. Jacques) and de Courcelle north to the Glen and up Lansdowne to Western Ave. (now de Maisonneuve), where it continued to Metcalfe. A four-foot branch also went up Lansdowne to Sherbrooke and up to the foot of the hill as a three-foot sewer.

But the heavy rains and flooding continued: "Two unusually severe rain storms during the summer flooded all sections of

through 1940 with installations on Kensington, Olivier, Mountain, Argyle, Côte St. Antoine, and the intersection of Côte Rd. and Metcalfe.

These varied from 2x3-foot egg-shaped sewers to 5-foot horseshoe-shaped ones, larger ones reported to be built at an average depth of 27 feet in tunnel sections, a method chosen to minimize inconvenience to the public and save in cost. And, it was noted, the work was planned "so that only small sections of the street were open at any time."

While the city's large buildings were not yet built, the population was reported by the city that year to be 24,692, some 16 percent higher than today's.

# Springfield resident calls for flooding solution

A survey of 20 out of 25 houses on Springfield Ave. shows that 15 experienced some sort of water infiltration during the May 29 flood, according to Diana Bruno, a longtime resident of the short street.

Many of the affected homes had installed back-water valves after heavy rain in 2005 as had she, but her basement has still had water infiltration three times since August 2011, she told the *Independent* last week.

"Most of the houses had water problems directly due to the incapacity of the city sewers to handle a large volume of storm water in a short period of time," she explained. "Having back-up valves is not good enough; the water comes up through the roof drain. I want to know what the city is doing about it."

Planning to bring her concerns to the

interview, that many basements at that time were not finished as they are today and so perhaps homes were not so adversely affected by flooding.

It was in the 1960s, that a new sewer system went into effect and the large collector along St. Catherine was built. It was the first Public Works project that Ed McCavour (a retired Public Works director and assistant city director general) worked on as a junior engineer.

"We'd been getting a lot of flooding from run-off," he recalled in a recent interview. "The sewers couldn't handle it." McCavour remembers being able "to walk on my hands and knees" through the sewers, placing a stick just below the diameter to keep him "above the effluence."

## Installation of retention basins

Today, states Councillor Patrick Martin, Public Works and Utilities commissioner, the solution to flooding appears to lie in the installation of retention basins, which, he said last week, he hopes can begin in 2013 after being provided for in the city's capital works budget.

The one thing that doesn't change is Westmount's location on the side of a mountain whose topography accelerates run-off during downpours and whose sewer system was built up principally to drain effluence without a storm sewer network.

"But that's something we can't change," Martin noted, in addition to, as history suggests, recurring heavy rain.

city council meeting October 1 with other residents of the street, Bruno said that the water problem "is a source of stress. You don't dare go away in the summer in case there's another storm and you aren't there to clean up."

Bruno also said she had filed a claim with the city after the July 4 rainstorm but received a letter saying it had been denied and she had six months to contest the decision.

Following the July storm, Mayor Peter Trent announced that the city was extending a study of the problem from south of St. Catherine to include other areas after reports of widespread flooding. In the "short term," residents have been asked to take steps to mitigate individual problems (see August 14, p. 1).

## Police and PSU to hold bike light program Oct. 4

A police program to encourage cyclists to outfit their bikes with front and rear lights will take place Thursday, October 4 at Lansdowne and de Maisonneuve in collaboration with Public Security.

Called "Operation Éclairage," the program takes place in the evening, scheduled to start at 4 pm.

Cyclists without lights will be given either a red LED rear light or a white LED headlight – or both depending on availability. The lights have been provided by both police and Public Security.

Officers will explain the importance of bicycle lights not only as required by the Quebec Highway Safety Code but also as a safety precaution so cyclists are more easily seen. The need for cyclists to be more visible at night was raised recently at a city council meeting, noted local Station 12 commander Stéphane Plourde.

## Long meeting – car idling

A parked car left running for more than an hour September 12 in front of 4142 Dorchester was ticketed \$57 for exceeding the three-minute limit in the city's traffic by-law, according to Public Security reports. The owner, who was traced through police, was contacted and explained she had been attending a meeting that lasted longer than expected.

# Local police sergeant awarded Medal of Bravery

Westmount Station 12 police sergeant François Paquette was awarded Canada's Medal of Bravery September 19 by Governor General David Johnston at a presentation ceremony in Quebec City for his role in helping save the life of a drowning woman in 2009.

Paquette, who was serving at Station 16 in Verdun at the time, also helped pull his partner Sgt. Simon Rivard to shore, said Station 12's lieutenant Jacques Meunier, who coincidentally was also then working at the Verdun station.

Both Paquette and Rivard received the Canadian medal after having been decorated by the Quebec government with its medal for meritorious service presented last year by the lieutenant governor.

When the details of the rescue unfolded, said Meunier, it was so impressive,

“we knew they deserved special recognition.”

The two officers had answered a call about a woman in a wheelchair who had intentionally rolled into the St. Lawrence the afternoon of June 23. Finding her about 20 feet from shore, Paquette returned to the patrol car to get a life preserver. But on returning he discovered his partner in the water trying to bring the sinking woman ashore.

When Rivard lost his footing, Paquette went into the water himself holding on to a large branch extended by a citizen on shore. Then, with one hand Paquette managed to grab hold of Rivard, and together they brought the woman to shore.

Paquette was lauded for successfully administering CPR to the woman.

Meunier, who sponsored the medal applications, said among the criteria and complicated

# City to present report aiming to prevent bid-rigging

Recent testimony at the Charbonneau Commission into collusion and corruption in the construction industry has led to the preparation of a city report on measures that Westmount can put in place to protect itself against alleged bid-rigging for infrastructure projects.

Mayor Peter Trent told the *Independent* September 28, in response to a question concerning roadwork already under way, that he had asked city director general Duncan Campbell to prepare a report on

the issue.

He expected the report to be presented at the council meeting after press time on October 1.

Setting out safeguards for future work is particularly important for 2013, Trent said. This is when the city is expected to focus on renewing city infrastructure – road work in particular – that had been neglected during the merger years with Montreal.

This was one of the city council's announced priorities for its current mandate.

## Remedy found for noisy street plate

While on patrol September 14, public safety officer Jason Souza noticed a large amount of noise being generated when cars passed over a metal plate that contractors had placed over road work outside 322 Victoria, Public Security officials said.

While pondering how to solve the prob-

lem around 7:20 pm, he was approached by several people who reportedly expressed similar concerns about the annoyance. As a result, Souza contacted Public Works crews who arrived at 7:38 pm to place asphalt on either side of the plate to better balance it.

## OPEN LETTER TO MAYOR: STOP NIGHTTIME RAIL WORK

I am writing this letter in order to address the situation regarding the installation of a third rail currently taking place along the CP Rail right-of-way.

We appear to have been duped by CP, which is creating an intolerable noise situation with respect to this work. The work has been carried out from 10 pm to 4 am every night for the last two weeks. Where the work is being done, no resident can sleep.

## Public Security asks court to allow maximum fine

Westmount Public Security has asked Montreal Municipal Court to allow the city to impose two maximum fines of \$2,000 plus a \$500 fee in regards to ongoing violations of By-law 1387 regarding noise at the 215 Redfern condo construction site.

The request was made September 20 following the latest in a string of complaints from residents and tickets issued at the minimum fine of \$200 and \$67 in administrative fees, said assistant Public Security director Greg McBain.

While city by-laws set maximum fines, the city typically issues tickets at the minimum amount, he explained. When pursuing the larger amount, it goes through the court, which notifies the alleged offender.

The city's recommendations to the court in this case, McBain said, are based on the number of tickets already issued, the ongoing nature of the project, its extent and estimated cost, reported at some

\$14 million. This renders the lower ticket of \$267 to be of little deterrent, he explained.

The request stemmed from an incident September 14 when an officer responded at 8:01 pm to "numerous calls" and reported finding a large crane being assembled at the site.

While city regulations prohibit the use of heavy equipment after 6 pm on weekdays – in this case, a Friday – the city had issued permission for the work to continue to 7 pm and for the required trucks to occupy the street.

### *Late due to traffic*

The officer was told by workers that they were late due to many traffic problems and logistics related to leaving Trudeau airport in Dorval.

Personnel were informed of the intent to issue two tickets at the maximum amount: one to the contractor and one to the crane company.

now slated for adoption**

In a move expected to please many Westmount residents, city council was slated to adopt a modified water conservation by-law that eliminates time restrictions on the watering of lawns, among other changes, but stiffens overall fines.

The revised version of the draft by-law, included with the agenda for the October 1 meeting, which takes place after press time, was expected to be adopted after undergoing consideration following the original tabling in April and a public consultation meeting June 11.

By easing the regulatory requirements of what will be Westmount's first water conservation by-law, Councillor Theodora Samiotis, told the *Independent* last week that the city plans to focus on educating residents about the need to conserve potable water. Samiotis has been sponsoring the by-law as Environment commissioner.

The original version restricted the use of traditional "portable" sprinklers to every other day between 8 pm and 11 pm. The proposed by-law has no such restrictions. It also set out times for the use of automatic sprinklers, which will now be required to be controlled by 2017 by varying

means that include humidity regulators.

While this installation can entail a relatively small investment upfront, according to Councillor Patrick Martin, commissioner of Public Works and Utilities, it is cost-effective in the long run because it allows for lawns to be watered only when needed rather than when it is already raining, for example, a common sight.

"This wastes potable water, which costs money to purify."

The revised version also eliminates restrictions on the filling of pools and spas.

**Driveway washing still intact**

One controversial provision, however, remains in the new version. This is a general limitation on the hosing down of driveways, patios and outside walls to between April and May 15, ending almost a month before most gardens and lawns are being renewed. It does, however, allow for this when justified by "construction" or "landscaping," however, seems to be provided.

Under the revised version, penalties also have been raised to a range of \$500 to \$2,000 for individuals (from a proposed \$100 to \$1,000), and from \$1,000 to \$4,000 for a company (previously proposed from \$200 to \$2,000).

tims of their own success, he said. These are at de Maisonneuve and Greene, de Maisonneuve and Victoria and Victoria Hall, in descending order of use, according to Bixi statistics (see August 14, p. 9).

The other two sites are Hillside and St. Catherine, and Argyle and Sherbrooke.

Given that all bikes may already be taken from the Victoria Hall stand as early as 7 am on some days, said Lansdowne Ave. resident Henry Olders, the lack of availability discourages use of the bike-sharing program.

Lambert shares the same feelings and experience at the same station, which is the one nearest him, too.

Bixi spokesperson Michel Philibert told the *Independent* there are two options for increasing the size of docking stations, both requiring just a call from the city. One is to remove one "form" (section) of four bikes from a less-used station and add it to another. Or, to request an "add-on" to a station, which would require extra cost, though he did not know how much.

Bixis were introduced to Westmount in 2011 when the city purchased five docking stations of 15 bikes each in a contract that included the supply and servicing of the bikes at the locations chosen on an experimental basis.

Olders took out a Bixi membership some six months ago – one of some 580 reported in Westmount. He uses the system to get to work at St. Anne's Hospital by cycling from Victoria Hall to the Vendôme station where he catches a train to the West Island, and then returns again in reverse order.

Keeping up with the availability of bikes and docking places in real time via an app on his smart phone, he said he can arrive back at Vendôme assured there will be a Bixi available there along with docking space at Victoria Hall. But the status of the docking stations can change within moments.

He feels both stations are undersized, though Philibert said that the turnover at Vendôme is such that if no bikes are available one minute, another will be dropped off shortly.

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## New PQ minister visits Westmount city hall

# Meeting with Lisée 'open and frank,' Trent says

Newly appointed PQ minister for the Montreal and metropolitan region Jean-François Lisée spent an hour at Westmount city hall first thing Monday in initial talks with Mayor Peter Trent, which he described as "open and frank" and "a good start."

"I told Lisée we will always disagree on a number of things – language, the role of governance, left versus right – but let's focus on the things we can agree on," Trent said.

These included ways to strengthen the entire region, improve Montreal's fiscal problems, increase employment and rein in urban sprawl.

The meeting went on longer than scheduled and Trent said he was still uncertain why Lisée – accompanied by his chef de cabinet, André Bouthillier – chose to visit Westmount first among the de-merged municipalities, whose association Trent heads. He surmised it was because he had been in the municipal world since 1991 and Lisée "wanted some advice on the metropolitan region."

Trent told the *Independent* that he would report on the encounter at the council meeting that evening.

The discussion focused on a wide range of subjects, Trent said. Among them: how the island of Montreal was still suffering

the effects of forced mergers, the current pension crisis, the departure of francophones from Montreal because of high property taxes and that the CMM (Montreal Metropolitan Community) was "doing nothing" to stop urban sprawl.

Trent said he believed Lisée when he said he had been against the mergers, citing how Lisée had left as an advisor to then premier Lucien Bouchard in 1999. Lisée stated the provincial government "was not going to play with structures."

Trent said that to a question by Lisée on how to create employment, he replied that it was "very worrisome" that no one in the new cabinet had any business experience.

Trent told him the problem the new government was going to have with Montreal was not a language one but its politically left position and its announced plan to legislate small businesses to work in French, to increase capital gains taxes and giving in to the demands of students who marched in the streets.

"This is not what most francophones want to hear. I was quite frank."

Among Lisée's several mandates are overseeing other cabinet ministers involved in the larger Montreal region and being charged with building bridges with the anglo community.

No date has been set for another meeting.

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# MP Garneau speaks about danger of 'minor differences'

Fresh on the heels of a divisive election that brought the Parti Québécois to power in the province, federal Liberal member of parliament for Westmount-Ville Marie Marc Garneau spoke at St. Matthias' Church on September 23 as part of an ongoing speaker series about the "Narcissism of Minor Differences."

"Politics can sometimes be distorted and the differences that appear to exist between political parties aren't as great as they seem," said Garneau. "Those differences are deliberately exaggerated, in part, to ensure that voters can see a clear difference between parties."

Garneau, a former astronaut who has served as MP for the riding since 2008 and is currently the Liberal house leader, spoke first of his perception of what he deemed as a "hyperbolic" and "confrontational" system.

"It was quite a change for me to go into the world of politics, which can be very partisan by its very nature, because before that, as an astronaut, everybody liked me,"

he joked.

Garneau then spent an hour-long question-and-answer period covering a variety of politically charged questions on both the provincial and federal levels.

Less than three weeks after the Quebec election, many of the issues that dominated the provincial campaigns were still on the minds of the some 30 assembled audience members.

Garneau believes the Liberals' struggle highlights a challenge that faces all parties that have held multiple mandates. "It's hard to hold on to power. People want to change," he said.

A staunch federalist who also supports Bill 101 and is in favour of recognizing Quebec as a nation, Garneau was quick to quiet any fears that the ousting of the Liberals indicated a drive towards another referendum.

"The fact that the [provincial election] results ended up as they did is not at all an endorsement for the revival of separatism," he said. "Quebecers want peace and quiet in the land, and they want good gover-

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# One \$2M-plus sale in August

The following article relates to the registration of deeds of sale for Westmount property in August 2012, provided by city officials. A list of sales can be found on p. 21.

The highest price paid for a house in August was \$5 million in the sale of 40 Belvedere Rd., corner Sunnyside Ave. In fact, that is the third highest price for a residence in Westmount this year, but it was the only sale in August for more than \$2 million.

The stone house last sold in April 2008 for \$2,950,000. This time, it slides under the bar set by the sale of 3617 The Boulevard for \$7 million in March and of 205

Edgehill Rd. for \$6,410,000 in May, but the next highest price is \$3,800,000 for 177 Edgehill Rd. in February.

August saw 18 residential sales, which is about average for the month, down from 27 sales registered in July and 25 in June, but the prices are mostly more modest. Four sales brought prices between \$1.5 and \$2 million, five were for prices between \$800,000 and \$1 million, and the lowest residential price for the year came in the sale of what the city categorizes as a duplex at 61 Clandeboye Ave.

The average price of the 18 one- and two-family dwellings was \$1,380,861, the lowest raw average price since April, but the average mark-up over valuation was 36 percent, the highest this year, which helped push the adjusted value of the “typical” Westmount home to well over \$1.5 million.

By coincidence, the highest mark-up was represented by the highest price at 40

Belvedere, and the only markdown from valuation by the lowest price at 61 Clandeboye.

Condominium sales included two more of the new units at 11 Hillside Ave. and three different types of condos, including a made-over duplex at 37 Bruce Ave., an apartment at Château Westmount Square (4175 St. Catherine St.), and a townhouse at 4848 St. Catherine St., near the old Westmount train station. .... nance.

"Pauline Marois will not bring up the referendum, I guarantee it, because she will lose right away," he added.

The question-and-answer period also periodically drifted to federal politics. In addition to raising issue with some of Prime Minister Stephen Harper's policies, some concerned Liberal supporters expressed concern about the future of the

party and whether a potential merger with the NDP lay in its future.

"I'm of the belief that parties only merge when they see imminent death coming to them," said Garneau. "For better or for worse, I don't think the NDP or the Liberals see death coming to them."

Nobody asked if he would be running for the leadership of the Liberal party.

## Westmount Today, Yesterday and Before

# Côte St. Antoine, the oldest road in Westmount

We can trace the origins of Côte St. Antoine Rd. in Westmount to Notre Dame St. in Old Montreal.

When Notre Dame extended westward from the original settlement of Ville Marie on the St. Lawrence River, it followed the path of today's René Lévesque and Dorchester boulevards, then veered north to continue along our Greene Ave., which was identified for many years as "chemin St. Antoine." When it reached the corner of our present day Sherbrooke St., it turned northwest to rise along the south slope of the mountain.

### Village of Côte St. Antoine

The original farming families of Décarie, Hurtubise, Leduc and St. Germain, who were granted land along this road, formed the first neighbourhood that developed into the village of Côte St. Antoine before becoming Westmount in 1895.

Every time I walk along Côte St. Antoine Rd., images spring to mind of Amerindian peoples walking the same route but on a much smaller trail going through the wooded slopes of the sunny southwest side of Westmount mountain.

There exist many accounts of the presence of native peoples living, farming, fishing and hunting on this southwest side of the mountain. In 1535, Jacques Cartier wrote about visiting the Huron town of Hochelaga before being taken to the mountain. A plaque marks the area on McGill University grounds. Then the

Sulpician Seigneurs, founders of Montreal in 1642, established a village for native peoples adjacent to their Fort de la Montagne on present day Sherbrooke St.

### Indians wells

The original towers where children were educated can be seen on present day Sherbrooke St. at Fort Ave. Until recently Westmounters could remember "Indian wells" and a large tree near Argyle Ave. with deeply carved markings in the bark.

Midway through my presentation about the origins of Côte St. Antoine Rd. at Westmount Public Library on September 20, people attending began to share their personal experiences of Côte Road. One man told the audience how he had walked, counting his steps, from the Sulpician towers on Sherbrooke St. west of Côte des Neiges to the milestone erected on Côte St. Antoine Rd. near Forden Ave. to verify if it was really one mile.

### First of four talks on Côte Rd.

This was the first of four talks about the Côte Road scheduled for the Westmount Historical Association (WHA) fall lecture series. The next will be on Thursday, October 18 when architect Bruce Anderson describes Forden Villa and its demolition.

The WHA will give guided walking tours of Côte St. Antoine Rd. on Sunday, October 14 between 1 and 4 pm. We will start a new tour every 20 minutes, alternating French with English. You are invited to meet at the Hurtubise house at 561 Côte St. Antoine Rd.

Association (WWCA).

According to Philibert, there is no way that a Bixi from another system can be brought from outside and docked locally. The computer software that governs the operation of the docks does not recognize bikes from other cities.

Though all are the same model as Montreal's, each city has its own identity expressed through colour and look, he said. Bixis in Ottawa are red and white while those in Toronto are black. Other cities and their colours represented in the local fleet are Washington (red), Minneapolis (lime green), London, England (dark blue) and Melbourne, Australia (royal blue).

And, according to Bixi records, Philibert said, the malfunction at the Victoria Hall station August 26 was not fixed that day, being a Sunday, but was repaired by a technician the next day. As well, the problem affected three of the four docking "forms", so the entire station had not been out of order.

The letter concludes that the Vendôme proposal would require a complete revisiting of operations and legalities with CP, a point on which Mossop disagrees. There

is already a precedent for an off-hour terminus on the St. Jérôme line, he said. As well, CP has no freight trains on the commuter tracks through Westmount that would affect rescheduling.

In fact, he added, the AMT mentions feasibility studies concerning Vendôme now under way to improve access between the Metro and train platforms. This would provide “an opportunity” for considering the WTAG’s terminus proposal.

## The chimps are alright, says Westoll, author of book on fauna sanctuary

Our view of chimpanzees, which commonly associates them with scientific research but also with their unpredictably violent outbursts, needs to be recast from an image of fear to one of peace, says the author of a book about chimps that live at an exotic animal sanctuary on Montreal’s South Shore.

Andrew Westoll, the Toronto-based author of *The Chimps of Fauna Sanctuary*, was the Westmount Public Library’s guest speaker at Victoria Hall on September 19 as part of its fall author series.

The chimpanzees from the book’s title reside at Fauna Sanctuary in Chambly, where more than 100 animals of various kinds live out their retirement years.

“As long as the chimpanzee hasn’t been messed with first, you don’t have too much to worry about,” said Westoll after recounting the various horrendous ways many of the chimpanzees had been used for medical and industrial research before living at the sanctuary.

“I think we need to start recasting the public perception of the chimpanzee from

one of fear-making to one of actual peace-making,” he said. “It seems kind of crazy that we’re doing this kind of stuff to our closest evolutionary relatives right now.”

Westoll’s lecture comes in the days following an interview on CBC radio’s *The Current* with Jane Goodall, a conservationist and a familiar figure in the protection of chimps, who spoke about the value of protecting species that are going extinct.






