Public Security recruits 8 more patrollers for summer

Eight more Public Security patrollers have taken to the road and parks to boost the force's increased summer needs for enforcing by-laws, carrying out summer programs and answering a host of seasonal complaints that include noisy parties, dogs off leash, graffiti, parks curfews,

construction site issues and incidents at Summit lookout and woods.

"Everything gets busier in the summer," said assistant director Greg McBain.

The additional personnel are also needed to fill holiday gaps and replace two of the regular public safety officers who will be deployed to the bike patrol starting up this week.

The new recruits include five auxiliary public safety officers and three parks cadets.

The five auxiliary PSOs comprise three recent graduates from police technology, a parking inspector and a former member of the public security operation in Beaconsfield.

The three parks cadets are students in police *continued on p. 9*

Old arena no longer available in case of rain

Family Day to be outside Saturday – rain or shine

Only a thunder storm or very heavy rain would wash out the city's 37th annual Family Day this Saturday, May 26 in Westmount Park, according to Sports and Recreation officials. The event takes place from 10 am to 4 pm.

With the usual rain venue at the arena on the verge of demolition, "It's sunshine

or bust," said Claude Danis, program and community services coordinator. "We're holding it in the park no matter what – except a thunder storm."

So, while the city's best attended event – usually in the thousands – has evolved through the years with many new twists, this is the first time the stakes have been so high weather-wise.





Plant sale raises \$700 to redo conservatory courtyard

Sun shines for outdoor plant exchange, sale

First it was hail. Then there was a rain storm. But just in time for the city's annual exchange and sale of perennials to be set up outside the conservatory May 16, the sun began to shine. And, many noted, it couldn't have been a more fitting setting for the event.

For the first time it was being held outside and at a new venue resulting from closure of the arena, where the event had always taken place.

In the end, not only did people share the plants from their own gardens, but a total of \$710 was reported raised with more expected from the sale of remaining plants at Family Day, Saturday, May 26.

The proceeds will be used to redo garden beds and plantings in the very courtyard where the event took place, announced Councillor Cynthia Lulham, who chairs the city's Horticultural Advisory Committee (HAC), which organized the event.

Volunteers from the Westmount Horti-

cultural Society helped out at the exchange and sale and will also participate in the redoing of the courtyard.

As part of the courtyard's renewal, plantings will be rearranged and new ones added with the volunteer assistance of Westmount landscape architect Myke Hodgins, Lulham explained.

The courtyard between the Westmount Public Library and Victoria Hall has gone

through two evolutions since its creation in 1995 as part of the library's refurbishment when it was initially laid out in pea gravel. The central portion was later grassed over. But now, she said, the trees need pruning, garden beds should be raised, and shrubs and plants re-organized.

Post office thief now an RCMP case

The RCMP is hunting down a suspect who stole pre-paid envelopes from the Canada Post office at 4895 Sherbrooke St., corner Prince Albert.

The incident took place at 2:20 pm on May 11. Police say the post office employees recognized the suspect from mug shots they keep of known offenders.

"There was a female in the post office asking questions of one of the employees, and when he was distracted, the suspect grabbed seven packs of pre-paid envelopes and placed them under his jacket," said Constable Adalbert Pimentel. "We're not sure if the woman was working with the suspect or if she was just a customer."

A second employee saw the theft take place, and he chased the suspect as he fled the scene.

"The suspect ran to the Vendôme Metro station, but the employee lost him there," said Pimentel.

The suspect is already wanted for similar offences by the RCMP. The case has been handed over to the Mounties, given the federal aspect.

A pair of residential break-ins

Two homes in Westmount were broken into last week, although it appears both homeowners got off lightly.

A 59-year-old who lives on Montrose got a phone call from his alarm company around 1:30 pm on May 15, saying his home had been broken into. When he arrived at his residence, he noticed that someone had forced open his back door.

"Officers found a bag on the floor that belonged to the suspect, but nothing was taken from the home," said Pimentel. "There was also an alarm speaker that was ripped off the wall and lying on the ground."

It is possible that the alarm scared off the suspect before he had a chance to steal anything.

The second break-in happened sometime between 7 am on May 11 and 1 pm on May 12 at a home on Edgehill. The 71-year-old resident discovered someone broke into his home through a second-floor window, approximately seven meters off the ground.

"It's possible the suspect climbed up using a nearby fence," said Pimentel. "He

A CÔTE BIKE PATH WON'T BE PICTURE OF SAFETY

Regarding "More pleas for bike path on Côte Rd.?" (May 15, p. 10), for what it's worth, *all* the cyclists I have seen on Côte St. Antoine opposite Murray Park were going downhill, i.e. the wrong way on a one-way street. A bike path probably won't change that. This has implications where safety is concerned.

RADIATION LIMITS INACCURATE

When reviewing different standards for maximum permissible leakage radiation from microwave ovens, it is necessary to consider whether they apply to an empty oven or an oven typically loaded with a precisely specified amount of water at a specified starting temperature and placed in a standardized container.

Furthermore, it is very important to take into account the specifications for the instrumentation used to make the measurements, its distance from the oven and its orientation with respect to the oven door, for example directly in front or somewhat off centre and perhaps above or below, etc.

Leakage measurements made on the same oven in different countries could

yield widely different values in microwatts per square centimeter unless all the standardized conditions of measurement happened to be identical in all respects.

Therefore, radiation limits quoted in a letter by Megan Durnford ("When will Canada update microwave exposure limit?" May 15, p. 6) are not only incorrect, but meaningless and cannot be compared because they were not necessarily undertaken with identical instrumentation and under identical conditions of measurement, such as oven loading.

When microwave ovens are operated with a test load of 275 ml of water inside the oven, the requirement of Canada's legislation "Radiation emitting devices regulations – C.R.C., c. 1370" is that microwave leakage must not exceed 1 mw/sq.cm. at any location 5 cm away from the outside surface of the oven.

Rigelhof addresses Rotary on CanLit. and GreekDram.

Mention anything to do with Greek theatre and Terry Rigelhof will talk at great length.

Rigelhof, who taught humanities for years at Dawson College before retiring, is the author of more than a half dozen books.

His latest is *Hooked on Canadian Books: The Good, the Better, and the Best Canadian Novels since 1984*.

"Don't get me started on Greek theatre - I think Greek theatre is great," he told members of the Rotary Club of Westmount when he addressed them on May 16 during their weekly lunchtime meeting.

Rigelhof, who is an expert in Greek drama, was reminded by a Rotarian that several weeks ago Mayor Peter Trent used the expression "Greek chorus" when referring to a wave of opposition to the city's plans to build a new recreation centre next to Westmount Park.

Rigelhof said that the sense in which Trent used the word "chorus" is defined in the Oxford dictionary as a situation in which a group of people all echo one an-

other.

He said that the role of the Greek chorus, on the other hand, is considerably different and more elaborate. Among other things, the members of a Greek chorus comment on the action in a play, while offering a sense of spectacle, providing the main actors with a break, and offering background information.

But the Rotarian insisted: what did Rigelhof think of the mayor's usage?

"I'm just saying what I understand the usage to be," he answered. "I'm a cranky academic,

or try not to be a cranky academic. But I don't go around correcting punctuation in library books with a red pencil."

While talking about his new book, Rigelhof recommended two promising Canadian fiction writers: Will Ferguson, who wrote *419*, a novel about financial fraud originating in Nigeria, and Alix Ohlin, a Trafalgar School graduate, who was described by Rigelhof as "the next big thing in North American literature."

Recycling onto another property

A resident of Upper Bellevue complained to Public Security May 9 that someone had placed dark plastic garbage bags of garden debris on her property. They were not her gardener's bags. Under the city's new waste management by-law, only paper garden bags may be used. Public Works was called to remove them given that the non-conforming bags would not otherwise be collected.

Police starting bike-theft prevention program

Station 12 police are starting a new program to prevent bike thefts in the city, one which will be ongoing throughout the year.

Called “Projet Numéro,” the project will begin at the Family Day celebrations at Westmount Park on Saturday, May 26. Residents are asked to bring their bike as well identification.

“We will then give them a document to fill out that includes their personal information, a description of the bike and their contact information,” said Constable Adalbert Pimentel. “We then issue them a number, which we engrave on a bike and place an SPVM sticker that cannot be removed without damaging the bike.”

The number can then be used if the bike is recovered after being lost or stolen. And, Pimentel said, the number is more effective than a bike’s serial number.

“Many bike manufacturers use the same serial numbers on some models, so it makes it difficult for us,” said Pimentel. “This number is only used by the police,

so we believe it’s a more effective system.”

After Family Day, residents can bring their bikes to Station 12 (21 Stanton), where the police will give them the documents and lend them an engraver.

“When they’re done, they bring us back the documents and the engraver, and the number will be entered in our computers,” said Pimentel, who also offered these safety tips for bike owners.

“Always lock your bike, and if your front wheel is removable, lock it to the frame of your bike. If your seat is removable, take it with you and don’t leave your bike locked in one location for long periods of time.”

wood to find a mother skunk suckling several babies. Still I thought it was a good idea to dig a little pond and plant more fruit and nut trees. In June my cherry tree is full of laughing squirrels and in July the raccoons are fishing in the pond.

The squirrels are the biggest destroyers of vegetation and abusers of vegetables. There is no place they cannot go. When I began to grow vegetables on our roof I thought I might have finally outsmarted them. Ridicules. They particularly like to snap the necks of sunflowers and break the flowering ends of tomatoes and get into the beds right after I have planted seeds and mess about.

However, I have come to observe that they are most interested in the garden when I have just changed something – when I have seeded, transplanted or otherwise been messing about in there myself. They are much less interested in my established blueberries, raspberries and strawberries. So I have to ask, “Is it territorial?” Once I am out in the garden on a regular basis, they seem to back off a bit.

And as much as I curse them when I find a prized eggplant has been plucked before its prime and wantonly chewed on, I am working on the mindset that we are in this game together – kind of like raising teenagers. Each year, the harvest from my little urban patch increases, despite the obstacles. The squirrels, gophers, raccoons, skunks and birds, etc., might invoke a vision of the noble self-sufficient animal, living hand to mouth on its wits under some rock or in a tree, yet they have no natural predators, unless you count cars or the odd cat or dog.

We are forbidden to feed them, yet they are only living in and around our homes because of the food we provide them. The Wiki page shows a picture of a squirrel with the following caption: “Urban wildlife: a squirrel in Montreal searching for food in a garbage can.” Montreal is not only blessed with urban wildlife, but according to Wikipedia, we define it.

To an urban grower of vegetables and fruit, the coexistence with urban wildlife poses a particular challenge. When we first moved here, a neighbour discouraged me from even planting tulip bulbs because the squirrels would just dig them up. The presence of a live capture trap left by the previous owners in our basement did not register. I went about my regular gardening duties, setting up my compost and clearing out the crawl space under the house, only to find one morning that three raccoons could fit in a compost container with a tamper-proof lid and that the skunks had long been in residence in our crawl space.



Schneider Granatstein and Boudreault: Contemporary memories

Westmount artist Lynda Schneider Granatstein is exhibiting rich floral paintings in jewelled-Renaissance tones at the West End Gallery. And at Han Art, Louis Boudreault's large-scale portraits of famous artists as children dominate the gallery.

Lynda Schneider Granatstein at the West End Gallery

"Fragrant Memories" is a mixed-media series of floral still lifes. Painted in oils, the artist often depicts a sole flower placed in an ornate burgundy, green or gold cup. Inspired by a love of her grandmother's teacups and flowers, the formal compositions are enlivened by texture and script.

"Aqua Teacup and Lily" is a large composition painted on paper. In the background, a grid pattern adds a contemporary feel to the still life.

Another "Four Teacups in a Row" is an unusual composition of gilded cups and saucers. Easily described as works of art themselves, the cups' vertical placement emphasizes their delicacy and refinement.

Texture from cut and painted pasted paper adds to the depth and richness of the work. This technique is also found in Schneider Granatstein's figurative work. In "Backstage Warmup," the colours of the ballerina's petal tutu are repeated in the textured paper in the image's upper left corner.

Schneider Granatstein's work is cur-

rently on display at the West End Gallery, 1358 Greene Ave.

Louis Boudreault at Han Art Gallery

This Montreal artist is known for his drawings of famous literary or political figures as children. For this exhibit "In Search of Lost Time," Boudreault focuses on artists replacing a young Hemingway, Churchill or Mao with a Chagall, Calder or Kandinsky.

Many of these figures can be recognized. Salvador Dalí's mischievous up-turned smile is unmistakable. The boy with compelling eyes and enormous ears is a young Pablo Picasso. And the stern, if not troubled, face of an adolescent is undeniably Vincent Van Gogh, painted in his signature blue and gold tones.

Drawn on pasted paper on layers of coloured sheets and then painted, the imagery is both contemporary in feel yet antique. The imagery recalls daguerreotype portraits and combined with the paper's exposed edges evokes a portfolio or thumb-worn book.

Boudreault's textured representation

adds nuance to each portrait. Oversized, these images convey a "larger than life" and unforgettable personality. The exhibit continues on p. 16



Avataq works to make Inuit culture visible

The Avataq Cultural Institute is leading the effort to support and protect Inuit culture in northern Quebec – and its Montreal office is located right in Westmount.

“It’s making Inuit culture visible. It’s keeping Inuit culture alive,” archaeological assistant Andrew Papigatuk said of the non-profit organization.

Papigatuk, a 22-year-old from Salluit on the north coast of Nunavik, has worked at Avataq for more than three years. This summer, he’ll be in the north to do archaeological surveying around Aupalik, where an open pit iron mine is planned. Hiring young local residents, Avataq’s archaeological department will document the heritage of the area, saving artifacts they find in their excavations.

Papigatuk will also visit five of the 14 villages in Nunavik to work on local cultural projects. In all 14 villages, Avataq coordinates a local cultural committee of elders and young people, around self-determined cultural projects. Building an *umiaq* – a boat used for migration – is one past project. Starting a local radio program was another.

“We work with the youth as much as we can so the youth will be aware of our heritage,” Papigatuk explained. He pointed toward Avataq’s collection of recordings – thousands of hours of elders’ oral histories, which youth can learn from, he said.

“Inuit have a link with nature that we lost a long time ago – us white people,” said Avataq’s publications director Robert Frechette. His department is working on a book about whaling, a practice being re-born in Kangiqsujuak after 100 years. Frechette pulled a past publication – a children’s book – off a nearby shelf. Brightly coloured pictures of tools on each page were accompanied with their name in Inuktitut.

Avataq also studies trends in Inuktitut. It holds workshops, Frechette explained, to build vocabulary for aspects of the justice and health care systems, for example, without appropriating the equivalent French or English words. Avataq’s genealogy department traces the family trees of the approximately 10,000 Inuit in Nunavik.

Avataq was created in 1980, out of a request from elders. Five years earlier, the James *continued on p. 19*

New summer camp opens in Westmount

Westmount residents Philip Cutler and Gabriel D'Amico-Mazza, both 23 have put their own spin on the summer daycamp concept and founded the Laurus Lifestyle Summer Camp, which starts this summer.

The *Independent* asked the energetic duo how a "lifestyle camp" compares to a regular summer camp?

"I have been to many summer camps since a young age...I found it was always about physical activity," said says D'Amico-Mazza. "The mind basically shuts off. We want to make sure that, yes, [kids] are going to have fun and a great summer but that their minds will be kept active enough – the brain is another muscle, right?"

To keep the brain and the body active, Cutler and D'Amico-Mazza have developed "specific training areas" as part of the summer camp's curriculum. Children are given the opportunity to spend one hour a day honing their skills in an area of their choice under the guidance of one of the camp specialists.

The Laurus Summer Camp curriculum offers sports, fitness, nutrition, art, dance, language improvement, math and organi-

zational skills.


Cutler gave an in-depth explanation about the meticulous process of choosing "young, energetic" counsellors, who will act as the camp specialists. They are all McGill graduates and undergraduates and have a reference of expertise in one of the specialty areas.

Campers will also be offered a daily smoothie and will be taught healthy eating habits. "They will learn the importance of incorporating the right ingredients" into their diets, said Cutler.

For those aged 13 to 15, the camp offers the counsellor-in-training program. Young adolescents are given the opportunity to work alongside the camp specialists and learn how to organize activities and manage large groups of children. "This is an experience they can use in the next two to three years as they go on to CEGEP," said Cutler.



Algire, Velan create PC virus gizmo

Westmount entrepreneurs Marty Algire, 37, and Corey Velan, 35, are the creators of the recently-launched FixMeStick – a small USB device that has been designed to remove malware from Windows-based PCs.

The premise of the device is simple: if your PC is affected by a virus, you simply pop it in and leave it alone. “It takes anywhere from 40 minutes to a few hours,” explained Algire, but with the combination of three different anti-virus software programs, the stick is designed to clean your PC without requiring any user intervention.

The founders, based in an office building in Victoria village said, however, “You still need your anti-virus software. The [FixMeStick] is for virus removal.” Algire compares the device to a painkiller. “You take your vitamins every day but when things go wrong you take a Tylenol; this is the Tylenol vs. the vitamins.”

Velan and Algire came up with the concept for FixMeStick in 2011 while they were both working at Radialpoint Software. “In March 2011 we were approaching the point of now or never,” said Algire, referring to challenges of starting a business while raising a young family. “It took

about a year to [...] get the FixMeStick to work on a vast range of PCs,” said Velan. He jokes about sneaking into PC stores to test the FixMeStick’s compatibility on demo PCs.

FixMeStick was launched to the public on May 9. It is currently available for purchase on line at www.fixmestick.com. The initial purchase price of the device is \$49.99, and can be used on up to three different PCs. There is an annual renewal price of \$24.99.

The two entrepreneurs have already looked into an appearance on the television series *Dragons’ Den*, however did not meet the deadline for this year’s series.

Bay and Northern Quebec Agreement was signed. While the treaty established institutions like local governments and environmental protections, it had none to ensure the protection of cultural identity and language, Frechette said. Now, an elders’ conference is held every two years, providing Avataq’s direction.

Frechette noted Avataq gets funding from various sources – 52 different ones in 2011 – and so its mandate is also dictated by funders. “That’s a thing we are working on right now,” he said: the or-

ganization would prefer permanent funding through regional government groups to keep Avataq more accountable to the Inuit of Nunavik.

“Especially with the Plan Nord coming, Inuit are more nervous than ever about their language and culture,” Frechette said. Mining projects like that in Aupalik, he said, would bring in hundreds of outsiders. “Imagine the 200 people in Aupalik,” he said. “Imagine the threat to their identity, language and culture.”

Avataq’s main office, with several employees, is in Inukjuak. Its Montreal office, also created in 1980, now employs about 30 people, Frechette said. It relocated to 4150 St. Catherine St. in 2011, from Redfern.



Stir it up!

It's BBQ time! Here's a great secret to cleaning your grates. Instead of using a wire cleaning brush, cut a large onion in half, place the cut side down and slide the onion up and down the grates. This is also a nice way of flavouring the grill before cooking, but don't do it if you're grilling dessert!



Here are two marinades to flavour your meat and fish to kick start your summer grilling. A dry rub is a marinade made up of dry spices. A wet marinade contains a liquid medium. A non-reactive dish can be stainless steel or glass, not aluminum.

All-purpose BBQ rub

This all-purpose rub packs a flavourful punch. It goes well with pork tenderloin, pork or beef ribs, flank, skirt or hanger steak and chicken.

Ingredients:

1/4 cup granulated sugar
1 tbsp. firmly packed light brown sugar
1/4 cup paprika
1 tsp. chili powder
1 tsp. cayenne pepper
1 tsp. smoked paprika
1 tsp. kosher salt
Freshly ground black pepper to taste.

Directions:

In a small container with a tight-fitting lid, stir together the granulated sugar, brown sugar, paprika, chili powder, cayenne, smoked paprika, salt and several grinds of black pepper. Cover and shake vigorously to mix. Use immediately or store in a cool, dark place for up to one month. Makes about 2/3 cup.

Soy-ginger marinade

Soy sauce, sherry and ginger are combined to make an American version of Japanese teriyaki marinade, which is good on flank steak, skirt steak, chicken, pork and firm-fleshed fish. Marinate steaks, chops and chicken in the refrigerator for at least 3 hours or up to all day if you wish; marinate fish fillets for 1 to 2 hours. Large pieces of meat and poultry can marinate for 1 to 2 days.

Ingredients:

1/2 cup soy sauce

1/2 cup dry sherry
1/3 cup vegetable oil
2 tbsp. sugar
2 garlic cloves, minced
1 tbsp. peeled and grated fresh ginger

Directions:

In a small bowl, whisk together the soy sauce, sherry, vegetable oil, sugar, garlic and ginger. If possible, let stand at room

temperature for about 1 hour before using to allow the flavours to blend.


